Arthur Edward CARSON

Arthur Edward Carson was born on 25th May, 1894 at Charters Towers, Queensland to parents William John & Rebecca Carson (nee Ivell/Ibell?). His birth was registered in the name of Edward Albert Carson. He was a 21 year old, single, Labourer from Lea Street, Charters Towers, Queensland when he enlisted at Charters Towers on 2nd February, 1916 with the 52nd Infantry Battalion, 5th Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 2393 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs Rebecca Carson of Lea Street, Charters Towers, Queensland. Arthur had served 4 months in Senior Cadets.

Pte Arthur Edward Carson embarked from Brisbane on HMAT *Seang Choon (A49)* on 19th September, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 9th December, 1916. Pte Carson was written up for an offence on 9th October, 1916 while on board HMAT *Seang Choon* – smoking below decks. He was awarded a forfeiture of 1 days pay.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Arthur Edward Carson was admitted to the Park House Hospital at Codford, Wiltshire on 6th January, 1917 from 13th Training Battalion. He was transferred to the Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 7th January, 1917 with Asthma & Bronchitis.

Private Arthur Edward Carson died on 9th January, 1917 at the Military Hospital, Sutton Veny of Asthma.

A death for Arthur E. Carson, aged 22, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Private Arthur Edward Carson was buried in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 280 (according to information of Pte Carson's Casualty Form. Also no date of burial was recorded).

Private A. E. Carson is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 154.

Pte Arthur Edward Carson was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Carson's mother (father deceased) – Mrs R. Carson (sent July, 1921 & July, 1922)

SEND-OFF TO PRIVATE A. E. CARSON

The officers and members of the Charters Towers branch of the Australian Meat Industry Employees' Union, met in the Union Hall, Mosman Street, on Thursday, 20th April, to bid farewell to another of their members, Private A. E. Carson, who has been accepted for service at the front.

The proceedings took the form of a smoke social, which was well attended.

After the usual toasts had been enthusiastically honoured, the President, Mr J. J. Wallace, proposed "Our Comrade," who, he said, was going to try and do his little bit for the Empire, of which they ought to all feel proud, and also of the comrades who had gone willingly to death if need be. Good luck, and a safe return was the wish of every member of the Union.

Mr R. J. St. Clair, Past President, and Mr J. Nankervis, Vice-President, also voiced the sentiments of the Union, and hoped that Comrade Carson would keep in touch with the Charters Towers branch even as the others, who were somewhere east of Suez, "where there ain't no ten commandments."

Various songs and recitations were contributed by Comrades J. Witherspoon, C. Bird, J. Gage, J. Soden, and the evergreen Geo. Murphy.

ON behalf of the officers and members Mr H. Bonnell, Past President, in a neat speech, then presented Comrade Carson with a wristlet watch, and said that as it ticked off the minutes and hours of the campaign he hoped it would always remind him of the comrades left behind. To always remember the fair name and fame of Australia, to respect the King's uniform and to play up and play the game. He wished him God speed and a safe return.

Comrade Carson feelingly responded, thanking the members for the token, which he would always treasure, and no matter how hard the going he would always try and uphold the name of Australia for honor's sake. He sincerely hoped that he would not be too late to participate in the task the Australians have in hand.

After a most enjoyable evening the function was brought to a close with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne."

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
