Victor Roy BAKER

Victor Roy Baker was born at Palmer's Island near Clarence River, New South Wales to parents William & Mary Jane Baker (nee Maclean). His birth was registered in 1889 in the district of Maclean, NSW.

Victor Baker was a 26 year old, single, Labourer from Yamba, Clarence River, NSW when he enlisted on 7th October, 1915 with the 3rd Infantry Battalion, 13th Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 4146 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his father – Mr W Baker of Yamba, Clarence River, NSW.

Private Victor Roy Baker embarked from Sydney, NSW on HMAT *Aeneas (A60)* on 30th December, 1915 & disembarked at Egypt.

Private Victor Baker was transferred to 2nd Battalion on 14th February, 1916 at Tel-el-Kebir, Egypt. On 3rd March, 1916 Private Baker was admitted to Field Ambulance at Serapeum then transferred to 3rd Field Ambulance with Mumps. He was then transferred to Ismailia, Egypt on 19th March, 1916. On 22nd March, 1916 Private Baker embarked for overseas from Alexandria & disembarked at Marseille, France on 28th March, 1916.

On 19th April, 1916 Private Baker was sent to Field Ambulance in France & admitted the next day to No. 7 Casualty Clearing Station with Influenza. On 23rd April, 1916 he was admitted to Lahore General Hospital with nephritis.

On 11th May, 1916 Private Baker was admitted to Hospital Ship *Brighton* from Calais, France headed for England with acute nephritis & Bronchitis.

Private Baker was admitted to Hospital on 24th July, 1916 with nephritis – "readmitted from furlough". Pte Baker was discharged for return to Australia on 31st July, 1916.

Private Baker was taken on strength with 1st Training Battalion from Weymouth on 1st September, 1916 to Depot at Tidworth.

Private Victor Baker was attached to 1st Training Battalion as Home Service Details on 26th November, 1916.

Private Victor Roy Baker was admitted sick to Fargo Military Hospital on 2nd May, 1917 from 1st Training Battalion, Durrington.

Private Victor Roy Baker died of Gunshot wounds to right chest (Self Inflicted) on 6th May, 1917.

A Coroner's Court was held at Fargo on 8th May, 1917 & the Jury's Verdict was "Victor Roy Baker died on 6th day of May, 1917 at Fargo Military Hospital from the effects of a self-inflicted revolver-shot wound and so do further say that the said Victor Roy Baker not being of sound mind did kill himself."

A death for Victor R. Baker, aged 26, was registered in the June quarter, 1917 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

Private Victor Roy Baker was buried on 10th May, 1917 at Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire – Plot number 243. From the burial report of Pte Baker - Coffin was Elm. Remarks of Interest to Next-of-Kin – The Rector of Durrington is arranging for one of his parishioners to tend and care for this grave and he will gladly reply to any enquiries.

The Coroner for South Wiltshire's Inquest into death of Private Victor Baker –

The Coroner for South Wilts (Mr F. H. Trethowan) held an inquest at Fargo Military Hospital on Tuesday concerning the death of an Australian soldier named Victor Roy Baker, whose home was in New South Wales.

Second-Lieutenant Howell said that Baker had been acting as batman for him and two other officers. He had been depressed for some time, but there was nothing in his behaviour to indicate that he might take his life. He was not supposed to carry a revolver, though it would be a simple matter for a batman to obtain possession of one.

Corporal Stevens, of the Australian Military Police, said that on Wednesday, May 2nd, he went to a revolver trench and saw Baker lying in it, with a revolver by his side, and suffering from a bullet wound in the chest. He intimated that he shot himself because he was suffering from venereal disease.

Captain Richmond, R.A.M.C., said Baker was admitted to Fargo Military Hospital suffering from severe haemorrhage caused by a bullet wound, apparently self-inflicted. From what the man said he gathered that the disease from which he suffered had got on his mind. He died on May 6thfrom the haemorrhage.

A verdict of "Suicide whilst of unsound mind" was returned. (With thanks to Salisbury Inquests)

Mary Baker, mother of the late Private Victor Roy Baker wrote a letter to Base Records dated 3rd June, 1917 – "We have been notified from Brisbane that our son Victor Roy Baker died of gunshot wounds received in action 6th May last, his death occurred in Hospital at Fargo. We are wondering if there is a mistake as he was not in the Firing Line having been reported as unfit for further military duties almost a year ago, he was then about to be returned to Australia but was one of eighty who were retained for Hospital orderly dutiesWould you kindly reply by return if the report is correct. Mary Baker" A reply was sent from Officer in Charge of Base Records dated 19th June, 1917 informing Mrs Mary Baker that her son had died on 6th May, 1917 "of wounds, self inflicted whilst not of sound mind."

Private Victor Roy Baker requested in his Will dated 20th April, 1916 that in the event of his death he gives £20 to Mrs Mary Jane Baker & £20 to Mrs Muriel Baker & the remaining part of his property he gives to Mr. William M. Baker of Yamba.

Private V. R. Baker is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 31.

Private Victor Roy Baker was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Baker's father – Mr William Maurice Baker (November, 1921 & August, 1922)

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Victor Roy Baker – service number 4146 as being 28 years old & served with 2nd Battalion Australian Infantry. No family details are listed.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones


The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
