Herbert Roy BAKES

Herbert Roy Bakes was born on 30th April, 1897 at Quamby Brook, Deloraine, Tasmania to parents Arthur Henry & Elizabeth Bakes (nee Donald).

Herbert Roy Bakes attended school at Golden Valley, Tasmania.

Herbert Roy Bakes was a 21 year old, single, Farm Labourer from Quamby Brook, Tasmania when he enlisted at Quamby Brook on 22nd May, 1918 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His religion was Church of England & his next of kin was listed as his father – Mr Arthur Bakes of Quamby Brook, Tasmania. On his Attestation Papers, Herbert Bakes answered *"Exempt, Area 91"* to the question *"Do you belong to or have you ever served in His Majesty's Army, the Marines, the Militia..."*

Private Herbert Roy Bakes was posted to 1st Depot Battalion at Claremont, Tasmania on 21st June, 1918 for recruit training.

Private Herbert Roy Bakes, Service number 63246, embarked from Melbourne on SS *Zealandic* on 5th October, 1918 with the 3rd Tasmanian Reinforcements (3rd G.S.R. (Tas) – 3rd General Service Reinforcements (Tasmania). He was admitted to Ship's Hospital at Sea on 15th November & discharged on 30th November, 1918. Private Bakes disembarked at London, England on 5th December, 1918

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Herbert Roy Bakes was marched in to 1st Training Battalion, Sutton Veny, Wiltshire & allotted to 12th Battalion Reinforcements on 5th December, 1918.

Private Herbert Roy Bakesreported sick to Group Clearing Hospital, Sutton Veny on 28th December, 1918. He was marched in to 1st Training Battalion from Group Clearing Station on 9th January, 1919.

Private Herbert Roy Bakes was admitted to the 1st Australian General Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 22nd January, 1919 with Bronchitis. He was reported dangerously ill with Pneumonia.

Private Herbert Roy Bakes died at 5.45 p.m. on 24th January, 1919 at the 1st Australian General Hospital, Sutton Veny of Broncho Pneumonia.

A death for Herbert R. Bakes, aged 21, was registered in the March quarter, 1919 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Private Herbert Roy Bakes was buried at 3 p.m. on 28th January, 1919 in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 39.


From the burial report of Private Herbert Roy Bakes - Coffin was Elm with Brass Mounts – Deceased was buried with full Military Honours. The coffin draped with the Australian flag being borne to the graveside on a Gun Carriage. Firing Party and pall bearers from the Overseas Training Brigade were in attendance. The "Last Post" was sounded and three volleys fired over the grave. One Officer and about 50 N.C.O.'s and men of the Depot attended the funeral. Headquarters A.I.F. Depots in United Kingdom were represented at the funeral.

Private Herbert Roy Bakes requested in his Will, dated 27th September, 1918, that all his property & effects be given to his mother – Eliza Bakes.

Private Herbert Roy Bakes was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Bakes' father – Mr A. Bakes (Memorial Scroll sent May, 1922 & Memorial Plaque sent November, 1922)

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Herbert Roy Bakes, 63246, of 12th Battalion, Australian Infantry, A.I.F., as the son of Arthur Henry & Elizabeth Bakes of Quamby Brook, Deloraine, Tasmania.

H. R. Bakes is remembered on the Roll of Honour for Deloraine District at Deloraine Ex-Services Club.







Front Inscription

Tasmania's World War One Roll of Honour, 1914 - 1918

The names of 3165 soldiers, sailors and airmen who were Tasmanian by birth or residence and died from their service in WW1 are commemorated on these walls. Their names appear alphabetically, grouped by the year of death. These men served with Australian, New Zealand and British units.

"What these men did nothing can alter now. The good and the bad, the greatness and the smallness of their story will stand. Whatever of glory it contains nothing now can lessen. It rises, as it will always rise, above the mists of ages, a monument to great hearted men; and for their nation, a possession forever. "

Mr A. H. Bakes, of Quamby Brook, received word from the Records Office that his son, Private Roy Bakes, had died in England from influenza. Private Bakes, who was only 21, had tried to enlist for some time past, had only been in England some few months, having gone with reinforcements for the 12th Battalion.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.


St. John the Evangelist Churchyard, Sutton Veny, Wiltshire, England

During the two world wars, the United Kingdom became an island fortress used for training troops and launching land, sea and air operations around the globe. There are more than 170,000 Commonwealth war graves in the United Kingdom, many being those of servicemen and women killed on active service, or who later succumbed to wounds. Others died in training accidents, or because of sickness or disease. The graves, many of them privately owned and marked by private memorials, will be found in more than 12,000 cemeteries and churchyards. The 26th Division was concentrated at Sutton Veny in April 1915 and No 1 Australian Command was there from the end of 1916 to October 1919. There was also a hutted military hospital of more than 1200 beds at Sutton Veny for much of the war and No 1 Australian General Hospital was stationed there after the Armistice. Sutton Veny (St John) Churchyard contains 168 First World War burials, 167 of them in a plot at the north west corner of the church. Of these, 143 are Australian. There is only one Second World War burial in the churchyard.
