Thomas BAXTER

Thomas Baxter was born in Rochford, Queensland on 24th October, 1894 to parents John & Alice Martha Baxter (nee Thomasson).

John Baxter, father of Thomas Baxter, died 28th November, 1897 in Queensland.

Thomas Baxter was a 23 year old, Stockman from Charters Towers, Queensland when he enlisted on 2nd October, 1916 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 4253 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs Alice Poschalk, Kirk River, N.Q.R., Queensland. (Thomas' mother had remarried in 1901 to Augustus Poschelk as his father had died in 1897).

Private Thomas Baxter was posted to 11th Depot Battalion on 6th October, 1916 for recruit training. He was transferred to 6th Reinforcements of 47th Battalion on 9th October, 1916 then transferred to 11th Reinforcements of 31st Battalion on 26th October, 1916.

Private Thomas Baxter embarked from Brisbane on HMAT *Kyarra (A55)* on 17th November, 1916 with the 8th Infantry Brigade, 31st Infantry Battalion, 11th Reinforcements & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 30th January, 1917.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Thomas Baxter was admitted sick to Fovant Hospital from 8th Training Battalion at Hurdcott, Wiltshire on 24th February, 1917.

Private Thomas Baxter died at 9.50 a.m. on 8th March, 1917 at Fovant Military Hospital, Wiltshire from pneumonia.

A death for Thomas Baxter, aged 23, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Wilton, Wiltshire, England.

Private Thomas Baxter was buried on 10th March, 1917 in the churchyard of St. Edith's at Baverstock, Wiltshire and has a Commonwealth War Graves Headstone.

Private T. Baxter is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 118.

Private Thomas Baxter was entitled to British War Medal only. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Baxter's mother – Mrs A. Poschalk (July, 1922 & November, 1922). (In a letter to Australian Imperial Forces, dated 16th August, 1921, from the stepfather of Thomas Baxter, Mr A. Poschalk indicates that his wife, the mother of Private Baxter was deceased.)

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Thomas Baxter – service number 4253, aged 23 years & served with 31st Battalion Australian Infantry. He was the son of John and Alice Baxter, of Marion St, Charters Towers, Queensland.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. Edith's Churchyard, Baverstock. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

A letter from Base Records, dated 2nd July, 1921, to Mrs A. Poschalk, Marion St, Charters Towers, Qld., advised that a letter from the Defence Dept. concerning an inscription for the headstone of the late Private T. Baxter had not been answered & non-receipt of a reply within 21 days would have to be accepted as indicating that no further action was to be taken. From letters in Private Baxter's Service Record file it is believed that his mother – Mrs A. Poschalk died sometime between 17th May, 1921 & 16th August, 1921.

Private T. Baxter does have a personal inscription on his headstone.
