Eric Thomas BROWN

Eric Thomas Brown was born at Moruya, NSW in 1889 to parents Thomas Glover Brown & Euroma Kiora Brown (nee Harkus).

Eric Thomas Brown attended Enmore Public School, NSW.

The 1913 Australian Electoral Roll for the division of Enmore, NSW listed Eric Thomas Brown, Printer, of 15 Belmore Street. His parents Thomas Glover Brown, Solicitor & Euroma Brown, Domestic Duties, were listed at the same address.

Eric Thomas Brown stated on his Attestation Papers for the Australian Imperial Force that he had been apprenticed to W. M. MacLurchy, Sydney for 5 years.

Eric Thomas Brown was a 24 year old, single, Printer when he enlisted at Randwick, Sydney, NSW on 25th August, 1914 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 360 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs T. G. Brown, 15 Belmore Street, Enmore, NSW. Eric Brown stated on his Attestation Papers that he had previously served with Australian Corps of Signallers & was discharged for time expired.

Private Eric Thomas Brown was posted to 4th Battalion on 25th August, 1914 for recruit training

Private Eric Thomas Brown embarked from Sydney, NSW on HMAT *Euripides (A14)* on 20th October, 1914 with the 4th Infantry Battalion "D" Company.


4th Battalion

The 4th Battalion was among the first infantry units raised for the AIF during the First World War. Like the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Battalions it was recruited from New South Wales and, together with these other battalions, formed the 1st Brigade.

The battalion was raised within a fortnight of the declaration of war in August 1914 and embarked just two months later. After a brief stop in Albany, Western Australia, the battalion proceeded to Egypt, arriving on 2 December. The battalion took part in the ANZAC landing on 25 April 1915 as part of the second and third waves. The commander of the 4th Battalion, Lieutenant Colonel A. J. O. Thompson, was killed the next day. At ANZAC, the battalion took part in the defence of the beachhead and in August, along with the rest of the 1st Brigade, led the charge at Lone Pine. The battalion served at ANZAC until the evacuation in December.

Private Eric Thomas Brown was admitted to the Royal Victoria Hospital, Netley, Hampshire, England on 20th May, 1915 seriously ill with gunshot wounds to skull.

[Note - The Service Record file for Private Eric Thomas Brown does not list his movements after boarding HMAT Euripides (A14) on 20th October, 1914 in Sydney. No details are given as to when or where he was wounded in action. Newspaper Memorial Notices (see below) indicate that Private Eric Thomas Brown was wounded at the Dardanelles.]

Private Eric Thomas Brown died on 24th May, 1915 at Royal Victoria Hospital, Netley, Hampshire, England from wounds received in action – gunshot wound to skull.

A death for Eric Brown, aged 25, was registered in the June quarter, 1915 in the district of South Stoneham, Hampshire, England.

Private Eric Thomas Brown was buried in Netley Military Cemetery, Hampshire, England – Plot number C.E. 1692 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

A War Pension was granted to Mrs Euroma Kiora Brown, mother of the late Private Eric Thomas Brown, in the sum of £39 per annum from 24th July, 1915. The War Pension to Mrs E. K. Brown was amended to £2 per fortnight from 20th July, 1916.

Private Eric Thomas Brown was entitled to 1914/15 Star, British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Brown's father - Mr T. G. Brown, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent August, 1921 & Plaque sent November, 1921).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Eric Thomas Brown – service number 360, aged 26, of 4th Battalion, Australian Infantry. He was the son of Thomas and Euroma Kiora Brown, of 15th Belmore St., Enmore Sydney.

Private E. T. Brown is commemorated on the Roll of Honour, located in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 39.



Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

Netley Military Cemetery, Hampshire, England

Netley Military Cemetery is a permanent military cemetery, the property of the Ministry of Defence. The cemetery was at the back of the Royal Victoria Military Hospital and was used during both wars for burials from the hospital. The cemetery contains 637 First World War burials but only 35 from the Second World War. In addition to the Commonwealth graves, there are a number of war graves of other nationalities including 69 German graves dating from the First World War.


