Ernest CARR

Ernest Carr was born in 1893 at Woolbrook, New South Wales. His birth was registered in 1893 in the district of Walcha. His mother was listed as Mary I. Carr, his father was not listed. Ernest Carr's parents – Ernest Moffat Carr & Mary Isabel Martin married in the district of Murrurundi, NSW on 16th May, 1894.

Ernest Carr was a 22 year old, married*, Labourer from Woolbrook, NSW when he enlisted at Boggabri on 20th November, 1915 with the 33rd Infantry Battalion "A" Company of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 31 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his wife – Mrs Bertha Carr of Manilla, New South Wales.

A marriage was registered in the district of Manilla, NSW in 1916* between Ernest Carr and Bertha McDonald. (* Ernest Carr enlisted in 1915 & stated he was married)

Pte Ernest Carr embarked from Sydney on HMAT *Marathon (A74)* on 4th May, 1916 & disembarked at Devonport, England on 9th July, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Pte Ernest Carr was admitted seriously ill – pneumonia to Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire on 8th September, 1916.

Pte Ernest Carr died on 9th October, 1916 at Fargo Military Hospital of Pneumothorax Cardiac Failure.

A death for Ernest Carr, aged 23, was registered in the December quarter, 1916 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

Pte Ernest Carr was buried at Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire – plot number 111 on 12th October, 1916.

Private E. Carr is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 121.

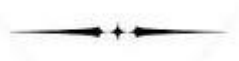
A War Pension was awarded to Mrs Barth Carr, widow of late Pte Ernest Carr, in the sum of £2 per fortnight granted from 14th December, 1916

Pte Ernest Carr was entitled to British War Medal only. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Carr's widow – Mrs Bertha Carr of Namoi Street, Manilla, NSW (February, 1922 & August, 1922)

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Ernest Carr – service number 31 as having served with 33rd Battalion Australian Infantry. He was the son of Ernest and Mary Isabella Carr; husband of Bertha Carr of Box Vale, Halls Creek, Manilla, New South Wales. Born at Woolbrook, NSW.

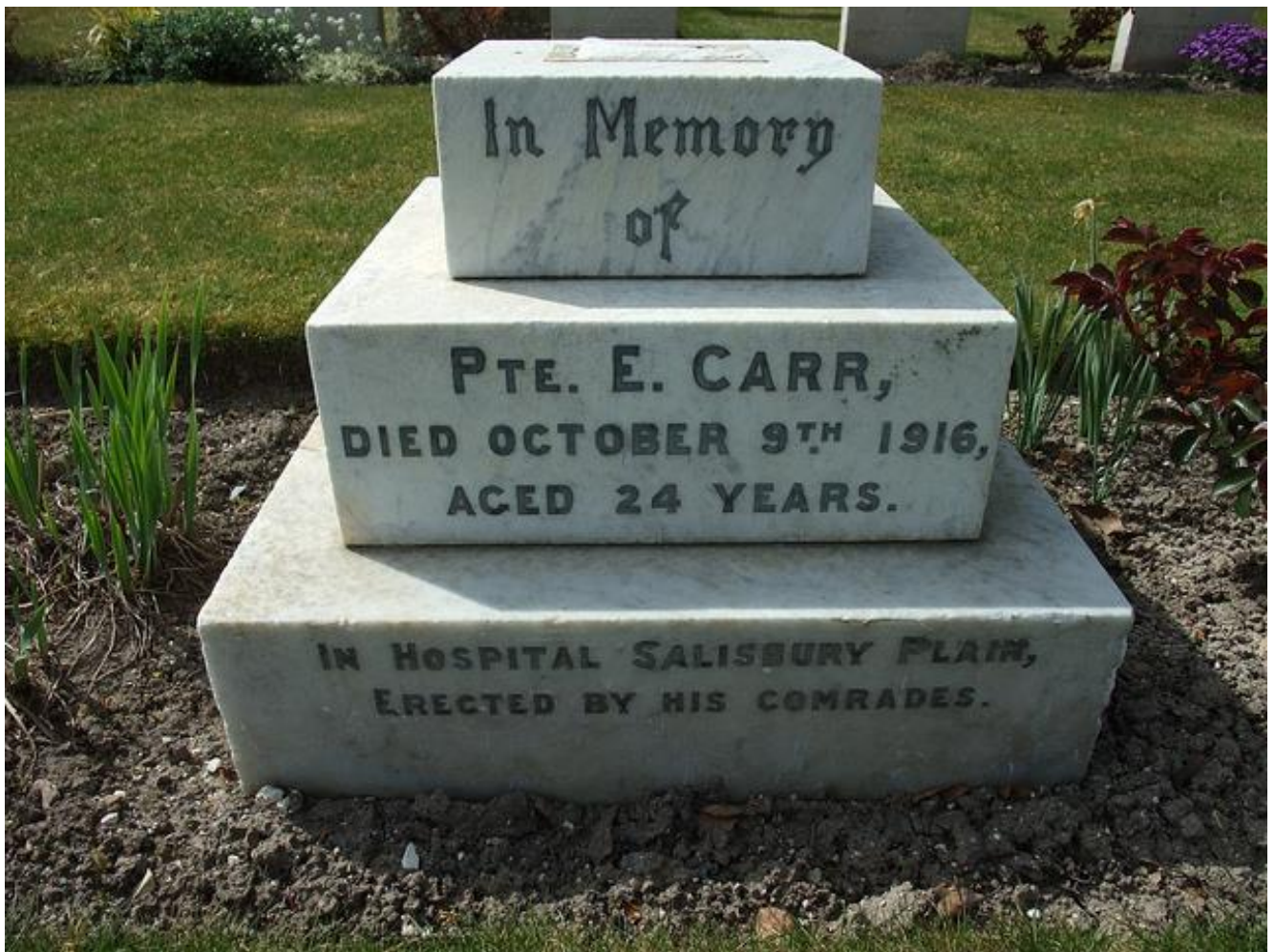
