## **Francis Peter CROW**

Francis Peter Crow was born at East Melbourne on 28th December, 1897 to parents James Francis & Margaret Crow (nee Hill).

Francis Peter Crow attended Trinity Grammar, Kew, Victoria.

Francis Peter Crow was an 18 year old, single, Labourer from "Torwood", Riddell, Victoria when he enlisted in Melbourne, Victoria on 24th January, 1916 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 22253 & his religion was Presbyterian. His next of kin was listed as his father – Mr J. F. Crow, "Torwood", Riddell, Victoria. Francis Peter Crow stated on his Attestation Papers that he had served for 3 ½ years with Senior Cadets 53rd Battalion.

As Francis Peter Crow was under the age of 21 years, his parents were required to sign their consent for their son to enlist in the Australian Imperial Force for active service abroad. J.F. Crow & Margaret Crow both signed their consent.

Gunner Francis Peter Crow was posted to Field Artillery Brigade Reinforcements on 9th February, 1916 for recruit training. He was transferred to 23rd Howitzer Brigade, 109th Battery on 1st May, 1916.

Gunner Francis Peter Crow embarked from Melbourne, Victoria on HMAT *Medic (A7)* on 20th May, 1916 with the 23rd Howitzer Brigade, 109th Battery, Australian Field Artillery & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 18th July, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

[Note: there is no record in the Service Record file of Gunner Francis Peter Crow as to where he was posted in regards to his training while in England.]

Gunner Francis Peter Crow died at 3.30 pm on 28th December, 1916 at Isolation Hospital, Salisbury, Wiltshire from Scarlet Fever. ("His 19th Birthday" – as listed on the Roll of Honour by his father James Francis Crow.)

A death for Francis P. Crow, aged 19, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Salisbury, Wiltshire, England.

Gunner Francis Peter Crow was buried on 1st January, 1917 in St Lawrence's Churchyard, Stratford-sub-Castle, Wiltshire, England – Plot number 104 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

Gunner Francis Peter Crow was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Gunner Crow's father – Mr J. F. Crow, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent February, 1922 & Plaque sent August, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Gunner Francis Peter Crow – service number 22253, aged 19, of 23rd Howitzer Bde., Australian Field Artillery. He was the son of James Francis and Margaret Hill Crow, of Torwood, Riddell, Victoria.

Gunner F. P. Crow is commemorated on the Roll of Honour, located in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 19.







## Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

### St Lawrence's Churchyard, Stratford-sub-Castle, Wiltshire, England

During the two world wars, the United Kingdom became an island fortress used for training troops and launching land, sea and air operations around the globe. There are more than 170,000 Commonwealth war graves in the United Kingdom, many being those of servicemen and women killed on active service, or who later succumbed to wounds. Others died in training accidents, or because of sickness or disease. The graves, many of them privately owned and marked by private memorials, will be found in more than 12,000 cemeteries and churchyards. Most of the 47 First World War burials in Stratford-sub-Castle (St Lawrence) Churchyard were made from the local hospital and more than half of them are of Australian servicemen who were based at the many Australian depots and training camps in the area. There are also two burials of the Second World War in the cemetery. (*Information from CWGC*)






