Francis James DENHOLM

Francis James Denholm was born at Sorell, Tasmania on 28th August, 1890 to parents George & Mary Georgiana Elizabeth Denholm (nee Bilton).

The 1914 Australian Electoral Roll for the division of Franklin, subdivision of Sorell, Tasmania recorded Francis James Denholm, Labourer from Clairvaux.

Francis James Denholm was a 25 year old, single, Farmer from Sorell, Tasmania when he enlisted on 10th April, 1916 at Claremont, Tasmania with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 5685 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his father – Mr G. Denholm, of Sorell, Tasmania.

Private Francis James Denholm was posted to 18th Reinforcements of 12th Battalion on 15th April, 1916.

Private Francis James Denholm embarked from Hobart, Tasmania on HMAT Seang Choon (A49) on 8th May, 1916 with the 12th Infantry Battalion, 18th Reinforcements.

Private Francis James Denholm embarked from Alexandria on *Arcadian* on 29th July, 1916. He was taken on strength of 3rd Training Battalion at Perham Downs, Wiltshire, England on 9th August, 1916 from Egypt.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Francis James Denholm proceeded overseas to France on 29th September, 1916 from 3rd Training Battalion in England. He was marched in to 1st A.D.B.D. (Australian Divisional Base Depot) at Etaples, France on 1st October, 1916.

Private Francis James Denholm was sent sick then admitted to 24th General Hospital on 7th November, 1916 with Mumps. He was transferred the same day to No. 6 Convalescent Depot then transferred on 12th November, 1916 to No. 5 Convalescent Depot at Cayeux still with Mumps. Private Denholm was discharged to Base Details on 18th November, 1916 & rejoined 1st A.D.B.D. at Etaples on 19th November, 1916. He proceeded from 1st A.D.B.D. at Etaples on 27th December, 1916 & was taken on strength of 12th Battalion in France on 30th December, 1916 from Reinforcements.

Private Francis James Denholm was wounded in action in France on 5-8th May, 1917 (dates as per Casualty Form-Active Service). He was admitted to 5th Field Ambulance on 6th May, 1917 with Shrapnel wounds to Face. Private Denholm was transferred & admitted to 3rd Casualty Clearing Station on 6th May, 1917 then transferred & admitted to No. 26 General Hospital at Etaples, France on 7th May, 1917. He was transferred to No. 6 Convalescent Depot at Etaples on 10th May, 1917 & discharged to Base Depot on 12th May, 1917 & was medically classified as "A" (fit for active service). Private Denholm was posted to 1st A.D.B.D. on 12th May, 1917 & rejoined his Battalion in France on 23rd May, 1917.

12th Battalion

The 12th Battalion was among the first infantry units raised for the AIF during the First World War. Half of the battalion was recruited in Tasmania, a quarter was recruited in South Australia, and a quarter from Western Australia. With the 9th, 10th and 11th Battalions it formed the 3rd Brigade.....

After the withdrawal from Gallipoli, the 12th Battalion returned to Egypt and, in March 1916, sailed for France and the Western Front. From then until 1918 the battalion took part in bitter trench warfare. The battalion's first major action in France was at Pozieres in the Somme valley in July 1916. After Pozieres, the battalion fought at Ypres in Flanders and then returned to the Somme for winter.

In 1917 the battalion took part in the brief advance that followed the German Army's retreat to the Hindenburg Line. For their valorous actions near Boursies during this advance, Captain J. E. 'Jim' Newland, commanding A Company, and Sergeant J. W. Whittle were each awarded the Victoria Cross. The battalion subsequently returned to Belgium to participate in the offensive that became known as the Third Battle of Ypres..... (Extract of Battalion information from the Australian War Memorial)

Mr G. Denholm, Sorell, Tasmania, was advised by Base Records on 26th May, 1917 that Private Francis Denholm had been wounded.

Private Francis James Denholm reported sick on 31st May, 1917 & was admitted to 3rd Field Ambulance on 1st June, 1917 with Cellulitis Leg. He was transferred & admitted to 56th Casualty Clearing Station on 1st June, 1917 then was transferred & admitted to No. 1 Australian General Hospital at Rouen, France on 5th June, 1917. Private Denholm was transferred to No. 2 Convalescent Depot on 21st June, 1917. He was transferred to No. 13 Convalescent Depot at Trouville on 19th August, 1917 with Cellulitis – Right Leg. Private Denholm was discharged to Base Depot on 14th September, 1917.

Private Francis James Denholm was marched in to 1st A.D.B.D. (Australian Divisional Base Depot) at Havre, France on 15th September, 1917 from Hospital. He proceeded to his Unit from 1st A.D.B.D. on 28th September, 1917 & rejoined 12th Battalion in Belgium on 5th October, 1917.

Private Francis James Denholm was admitted to 1st Australian Field Ambulance on 16th November, 1917 with Diarrhoea then transferred to 10th Stationary Hospital the same day. He was transferred to 59th General Hospital on 16th November, 1917 then transferred to St. Omer on 17th December, 1917. Private Denholm embarked for England on Hospital Ship *St. David* on 19th December, 1917.

Private Francis James Denholm was admitted to Royal Herbert Hospital, Woolwich, England on 19th December, 1917 with Tubercular Peritonitis. He was reported as seriously ill.

Private Francis James Denholm died at 7 am on 12th January, 1918 at Royal Herbert Hospital, Woolwich, England from Tubercular Peritonitis.

A death for Francis J. Denholme, aged 27, was registered in the March quarter, 1918 in the district of Woolwich, London, England.

Private Francis James Denholm was buried at 1.30 pm on 17th January, 1918 in Brookwood Military Cemetery, Surrey, England – Australian Military Burial Ground - Plot number 180402.

From the burial report of Private Francis James Denholm - Coffin was good polished Elm. The deceased soldier was accorded a Military Funeral. The coffin was draped with the Union Jack Flag. Firing Party, Buglers and Pallbearer, under the command of an officer, were supplied by the London Regt, stationed at Woking. The grave will be turfed immediately, and an oak cross will be erected by the A.I.F. London. Administrative Headquarters, A.I.F. London were represented at the funeral.

Base Records wrote to Mr G. Denholm, Sorell, Tasmania on 23rd March, 1923 stating that the site of Private F. J. Denholm's grave in Brookwood Military Cemetery had been officially registered as Plot 11 Row C Grave 2.

This is now recorded by CWGC as Memorial reference – XI. C. 2. Private Francis James Denholm now has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

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Private Francis James Denholm was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Denholm's father – Mr G. Denholm, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent March, 1922 & Plaque sent October, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Francis James Denholm – service number 5685, aged 27, of 12th Battalion, Australian Infantry. He was the son of George and Mary Georgiana Elizabeth Denholm.

Private F. J. Denholm is commemorated on the Roll of Honour, located in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 65.

Francis James Denholm is remembered on the Wall of Remembrance, at the War Memorial, Cecilia Street, St. Helens, Tasmania. The Wall of Remembrance commemorates those from Tasmania who died in service or were killed in action in World War One.

Front Inscription

Tasmania's World War One Roll of Honour, 1914 - 1918

The names of 3165 soldiers, sailors and airmen who were Tasmanian by birth or residence and died from their service in WW1 are commemorated on these walls. Their names appear alphabetically, grouped by the year of death. These men served with Australian, New Zealand and British units.

"What these men did nothing can alter now. The good and the bad, the greatness and the smallness of their story will stand. Whatever of glory it contains nothing now can lessen. It rises, as it will always rise, above the mists of ages, a monument to great hearted men; and for their nation, a possession forever."

Private Francis James Denholm

Connected to Private Francis James Denholm:

Older brother Ronald Bilton Denholm (born 10th April, 1888) – Enlisted on 8th March, 1918, aged 29 years & 11 months. Embarked from Sydney, NSW on 10th June, 1918 with 1st Tasmanian General Service Reinforcements.

Trooper Ronald Bilton Denholm, 50559, 3rd Australian Light Horse Regiment, returned to Australia from Egypt on 15th May, 1919. Disembarked in Australia 30th June, 1919.

He was discharged from the Australian Military Force on 13th August, 1919.

Entitled to British War Medal & Victory Medal

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
Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

Brookwood Military Cemetery, Surrey, England

Located 30 miles from London in Surrey, Brookwood Military Cemetery is the largest CWGC cemetery in the United Kingdom. The cemetery contains the graves of more than 1,600 servicemen of the British Empire in the First World War and over 3,470 from the Second World War.

Brookwood Military Cemetery lies adjacent to Brookwood Cemetery (The London Necropolis), a vast space which covers 500 acres. In 1917, an area to the north of the cemetery was set aside as Brookwood Military Cemetery for men and women of Commonwealth forces who died, many of battle wounds, in the London district. This site was further extended to accommodate Commonwealth casualties of the Second World War. (Information from CWGC)

There are 446 Australian War Graves in Brookwood Military Cemetery – 351 from World War 1 & 95 from World War 2.
