James Paul DONOVAN

Paul James Donovan was born in 1893 at Nine Mile Creek, Victoria to parents John Finn Donovan, Jnr & Ellen Jane Donovan (nee Arenich). Hi birth was registered

The 1916 & 1917 Australian Electoral Rolls for the division of Fremantle, subdivision of West Subiaco, Western Australia recorded James Paul Donovan, Labourer from Salvado Road, West Leederville.

A marriage was registered at Subiaco, Western Australia in 1917 between James P. Donovan & Annie Williams.

James Paul Donovan was a 23 year old, married, Horse Driver from Subiaco, Western Australia when he enlisted on 13th November, 1916 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 7239 & his religion was Roman Catholic. His next of kin was listed as his wife – Mrs Annie Donovan of 369 Barker Rd, Subiaco, Western Australia. James' older brother – Sydney Albert Donovan also enlisted the same day & was given the service number of 7240.

Whilst in Camp at Blackboy Hill, Western Australia, Private James Paul Donovan was written up for being absent without leave from Tattoo on 5th December, 1916 – this was later admonished. He was also absent without leave from Reveille on 22nd January to Reveille on 23rd January, 1917. He was forfeited one day's pay & reprimanded.

Private James Paul Donovan embarked from Fremantle on HMAT *Miltiades (A28)* on 29th January, 1917 with the 11th Infantry Battalion, 24th Reinforcements & disembarked at Devonport, England on 27th March, 1917.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private James Paul Donovan was marched in to 3rd Training Battalion at Durrington, Wiltshire from Australia on 28th March, 1917.

Private James Paul Donovan was admitted to Fargo Military Hospital, Durrington, Wiltshire on 24th April, 1917 suffering from Influenza & Pneumonia.

Private James Paul Donovan died of Broncho-pneumonia at Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire, England on 3rd May, 1917 at 3.30 p.m.

A death for James P. Donovan, aged 24, was registered in the June quarter, 1917 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

The Red Cross Wounded & Missing File for Private James Paul Donovan contains a letter written by the Assistant Matron of Fargo Military Hospital which reads:

"Pte J. B. Donovan died of Broncho-pneumonia on 3.5.17 he was buried on 7.5.17 in grave number 241 on right hand side of cemetery path at Durrington, Wilts. Pte Donovan made a hard fight against the disease, but when the lads who have been used to Australian climate get Broncho-pneumonia it goes very hardly with them. Pte Donovan's brother was with him most of the last few days, he was also in hospital but was convalescent. The sister-in-charge wrote to Australia directly after Pte Donovan's death, but the letter cannot have reached its destination yet."

Private James Paul Donovan was buried in Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire on 7th May, 1917- plot number 241. From the burial report of Private Donovan - *Coffin was Polished wood with Brass Furniture*.

A War Pension was granted to Annie Donovan, widow of late Private James Paul Donovan, in the sum of 40/- per fortnight granted from 7th July, 1917.

Private James Paul Donovan was entitled to British War Medal only. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Donovan's widow – Mrs Annie Donovan Mount Bryan East, near Hallett, South Australia (September, 1922 & August, 1922)


The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private James Paul Donovan – service number 7239 as being 24 years old & served with 11th Battalion Australian Infantry. No family details are listed.

J. P. Donovan & his brother S. A. Donovan are both remembered on the Subiaco Municipal Honour Roll, located in Community Centre, 203 Bagot Road, Subiaco, Western Australia.

J. P Donovan is also remembered on the Subiaco Fallen Soldiers Memorial located on the corner of Rokeby and Hamersley Roads, Subiaco. Known as "The Clock Tower". (3rd Column).

J. P. Donavan is remembered on the Western Australia State War Memorial which is located at the top of Kings Park and Botanic Garden escarpment, ANZAC Bluff, Fraser Avenue, Perth, Western Australia. The memorial was developed around an 18 metre tall obelisk as the principal feature, which is almost a replica of the Australian Imperial Force Memorials erected in France and Belgium.

The heavy concrete foundations are supplemented by heavy brick walls which enclose an inner chamber or crypt. The walls surrounding the crypt are covered with The Roll of Honour; marble tablets which list under their units the names of more than 7,000 members of the services killed in action or as a result of World War One.




Western Australia State War Memorial Cenotaph, Kings Park (above)



Private J. P. Donovan is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 62.





Connected to Private James Paul Donovan:

Older brother Sydney Albert Donovan (b. 1891) – Enlisted 13th November, 1916 as a 26 year old Labourer from Subiaco, Western Australia. Embarked from Fremantle, Western Australia on HMAT *Miltiades (A28)* on 29th January, 1917 with the 11th Infantry Battalion, 24th Reinforcements as Private 7240.

Returned to Australia 23rd September, 1918 as a result of Trench Fever & Gas Poisoning.

Medically discharged on 14th February, 1919.

Entitled to British War Medal & Victory Medal

Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire, England

Durrington Cemetery contains burials of both wars. The 204 First World War burials were mostly from nearby Larkhill Camp. Many of the graves are of Australian servicemen and there is a separate Australian memorial in the cemetery. The Second World War burials number 22. In addition to the war graves, there are a number of post-war service graves in the cemetery, mostly of the Royal Air Force.

Private James Paul Donovan does not have a Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstone. His headstone was privately erected by "his brother and Comrades of the 24 Reinfs. 11th Batt. A.I.F." prior to the CWGC headstones being erected for all soldiers.
