# **Henry William ELVERY**

Henry William Elvery was born at Barolin Road, Bundaberg, Queensland on 12th September, 1891 to parents William & Sarah Jane Elvery (nee Elvery).

He attended school at Woongarra State School, Queensland.

Henry William Elvery was a 24 year old, single, Farmer (Attestation Papers state Fireman) from Maryborough Road, Bundaberg, Queensland when he enlisted on 20th October, 1915 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 20942 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his father – Mr W. Elvery of Maryborough Road, Bundaberg, Queensland.

Gunner Henry William Elvery embarked from Sydney, New South Wales on HMAT *Argyllshire (A8)* on 11th May, 1916 with the 9th Field Artillery Brigade, 34th Battery & disembarked at Devonport, England on 10th July, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Gunner Henry William Elvery was appointed Driver with effect from 1st September, 1916 while attached to 9th Field Artillery Brigade at Larkhill, Wiltshire.

Driver Henry William Elvery was admitted to Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire on 31st October, 1916 with Bronchial Catarrh & then reported with Pneumonia 'severe' on 1st November, 1916.

Driver Henry William Elvery died on 9th November, 1916 at Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire, England from Pneumonia.

A death for Henry W. Elvery, aged 23, was registered in the December quarter, 1916 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

The Red Cross Wound & Missing File for Driver Henry William Elvery contains a letter from the Matron of Fargo Military Hospital, dated 26th January, 1917, after an enquiry was made by F. M. Madden from Portadown, Ireland who had been enquiring into Driver Elvery's death. The letter reads:

"Died 9.11.16 – No. 20942 Driver H. W. Elvery 34th Batty. F.A. A.I.F. was only in hospital a few days and was very very ill at the time. Everything was done that could be done, but he was very ill on admission. He died of pneumonia on 9.11.16 and was buried at Durrington, Wilts on 11.11.16 grave number 120. on Right hand side of Cemetery path. The Methodist Chaplain Captain Nye saw him when ill, and also buried him. The Sister who nursed Driver Elvery wrote to his people after his death. Relations who are so far away especially, have our most sincere sympathy."

Driver Henry William Elvery was buried on 11th November, 1916 in Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire – plot number 120.

Probate in the Will of Driver Henry William Elvery was granted to his father – Mr William Elvery.

Driver Henry William Elvery was entitled to British War Medal only. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Driver Elvery's father – William Elvery (March, 1922 & August, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Driver Henry William Elvery – service number 20943 as being 24 years old & served with 9th Bde. Australian Field Artillery. He was the son of William and Sarah Jane Elvery. Born at Bundaberg, Queensland.

Private H. W. Elvery is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 15.







## **Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire, England**

Durrington Cemetery contains burials of both wars. The 204 First World War burials were mostly from nearby Larkhill Camp. Many of the graves are of Australian servicemen and there is a separate Australian memorial in the cemetery. The Second World War burials number 22. In addition to the war graves, there are a number of post-war service graves in the cemetery, mostly of the Royal Air Force.
