# **GEORGE HARRIS**

3RD BN. AUSTRALIAN INF. 3RD AUGUST, 1916

### **George HARRIS**

George Harris was born at Lee, near Lewisham, Kent, England in 1890 to parents George & Sarah Harris (nee Pring).

The 1891 England Census recorded George Harris as a 9 month old, living with his mother & grand parents at 41 Ronver Road, Lee, London, England. His grandparents were listed as Benjamin Pring (General Labourer, aged 44) & Martha Pring (aged 43). Eight of Benjamin & Martha's children were listed on this Census (all born at Lee, London) – George Pring (Labourer, aged 24), Sarah Pring (Laundress, aged 20), Charles Pring (Labourer, aged 17), Ellen Pring (aged 14), Alfred Pring (Scholar, aged 13), Elizabeth Pring (Scholar, aged 11), Rose Pring (Scholar, aged 9), Benjamin Pring (Scholar, aged 6) & George as 9 month old grandson.

George Harris married Sarah Pring in the December quarter, 1891 in the district of Lewisham, Kent/London, England.

The 1901 England Census recorded George Harris as a 10 year old, living with his family at 53 Ronver Road, Lee, London, England. His parents were recorded as George Harris (Carman, aged 34, born Dadford, Bucks) & Sarah Harris (aged 30, born Lee, Kent). George was the oldest of five children listed on this Census (all born Lee, Kent)—George then Frederick Harris (aged 8), William Harris (aged 5), Albert Harris (aged 2) & Nellie Harris (aged 1 month). Also listed was Ellen Pring - sister-in-law of George Harris (senior) (Laundress, aged 24).

According to information provided by his mother for the Roll of Honour – George Harris came to Australia when he was 21.

The New South Wales Railways listed George Harris in 1914 as a casual cleaner at Eveleigh, Sydney, NSW.

George Harris was a 25 year old, single, Engine Cleaner (on Railways) from "Idsall", Mallett Road, Camperdown, Sydney, NSW when he enlisted at Holdsworthy (Holsworthy), Sydney, NSW on 9th August, 1915 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His religion was Church of England & his next of kin was listed as his father – Mr G. Harris, 61A Lower Road, Lee, London, S.E.

Private George Harris was posted to 7th Reinforcements of 18th Battalion on 14th October, 1915.

Private George Harris, Service number 3085, embarked from Sydney, New South Wales on HMAT *Suevic (A29)* on 20th December, 1915 with the 18th Infantry Battalion, 7th Reinforcements.

#### 18th Battalion

The 18th Battalion was raised at Liverpool in New South Wales in March 1915 as part of the 5th Brigade.....

Private George Harris was allotted to 3rd Battalion direct from Training Camp on 14th February, 1916. He was taken on strength of 3rd Battalion at Tel-el-Kebir on 14th February, 1916 from 18th Battalion.

Private George Harris embarked from Alexandria on HMT *Grampian* on 22nd March, 1916. He disembarked at Marseilles, France on 28th March, 1916.

Private George Harris was admitted to 2nd Australian Field Ambulance on 20th June, 1916 with Tonsilitis & was discharged to his Unit on 24th June, 1916. He rejoined his Unit in France on 24th June, 1916.

Private George Harris was wounded in action in France between 22 – 27th July, 1916 (dates as per Casualty Form – Active Service). He was admitted to No. 26 General Hospital at Etaples, France on 25th July, 1916 with G.S.W. (gunshot wound/s) to Thigh (mild). Private Harris embarked from Calais, France on 28th July, 1916 on Hospital Ship Dieppe for England with G.S.W. Legs.

#### 3rd Battalion

The 3rd Battalion was among the first infantry units raised for the AIF during the First World War. Like the 1st, 2nd and 4th Battalions it was recruited from New South Wales and, together with these battalions, formed the 1st Brigade.....

In March 1916, it sailed for France and the Western Front. From then until 1918 the battalion took part in operations against the German Army, principally in the Somme Valley in France and around Ypres in Belgium. The battalion's first major action in France was at Pozieres in the Somme valley in July 1916......

#### War Diary - 3rd Battalion

La Boissell – July 22nd, 1916:

Officers & NCO's carried out further reconnaissance of enemy front – Operation for this night cancelled and on on larger scale announced by Brigadier at conference of C.O.'s and preparatory orders issued.

The Brigade was to assault three objectives in enemies line before POZIERES & these were give to BN's vide operation orders attached to summary of 23rd inst.

22.00 – BN moved up to assembly trenches immediately in rear of 1st BN & occupied trenches prepared the previous night in rear of the Parados and along the POZIERES – CONTALMAISON ROAD.

1 O/Rank Killed 3 O/Ranks Wounded 1 O/Rank to Hospital

Pozieres July 23rd, 1916:

No hitch occurred & the action commenced punctually and each objective was assaulted and taken without any serious resistance from the enemy. The chief difficulty in consolidating the third objective was in getting touch with both flanks and being sure of the main road which was so much defaced by shells as to be almost unrecognisable. The consolidation was carried out successfully and along the line laid down. By daybreak the men were in trenches about four feet deep. That this work was so successfully accomplished is largely due to the energy and initiative displayed by Capt. J. R. O. Harris who commanded D. Co. and was the senior officer of my BN on the spot. My dispositions immediately after the position was gained were D and C Coys, four Lewis Guns & two sections of bombers in front line & in BDE original front line:- A & B Cos, 4 Lewis Guns, 2 Sections bombers & scout platoon & H. Qrs.

Demands for more men & guns were received and two Ptns with 2 Lewis Guns were sent forward. These were required to fill the gap on the right flank. On the 3rd Australian BDE connecting up these men were no longer required & were withdrawn leaving two Cos and 6 Lewis Guns in the line.

The work of consolidation and establishing communication was pushed ahead. The enemy shelled intermittently. NO Counter attack was launched on my front.

Patrols were pushed forward into POZIERES during the day and captured nine prisoners. These patrols were hindered in their work by our own artillery barrage which did not lift sufficiently to allow them to work freely.

Two large calibre enemy field guns were captured during this engagement on ground which was afterwards taken over by 3rd Aust. Bde. A claim for these to be returned as trophies to the Battalion after the war has been submitted.

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Private George Harris was admitted to County of London War Hospital, Epsom, England on 28th July, 1916 with shrapnel wounds to both Legs – severe.

Private George Harris died on 3rd August, 1916 at County of London War Hospital, Epsom, England from wounds received in action in France -G.S.W. left Thigh & Malignant Oedema. The Hospital Admissions form recorded "Patient died of gas gangrene Aug 3. The leg was amputated Aug 2 ....".

A death for George Harris, aged 26, was registered in the September quarter, 1916 in the district of Epsom, Surrey, England.

Private George Harris was buried in Hither Green Cemetery, Verdant Lane, Catford, London, England – Gravesite "A" Grave No. 651 (now listed by CWGC as Plot number A. 651) and has a shared Private Headstone. His death is still acknowledged by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

The Red Cross Wounded & Missing file for Private George Harris contains a letter that reads: "Pte Harris was in No 26 Gen. Hosp. on July 25th 1916, with wounds in both thighs caused by a high explosive shell. He was about 1 ½ miles from the scene of action of the 3rd Battn when it charged at Pozieres on July 23rd and he was carrying water at the time. He reported to me that he was out of touch with the Battn when wounded and will, he believes, be reported as missing."

Private George Harris requested in his Will (extracted from his Pay Book) that "In the event of my death I give half of my pay to Mrs G. Harris, 61a Ronver Rd, Lee, London, and the remaining half to Miss H. E. Piddlesdon, Valcyria, Milsons Rd, Cremorne, Sydney, NSW."

The personal effects of the late Private George Harris were sent to his friend – Miss Hilda Piddlestone, Naleyria, Nelson Rd, Cremorne, NSW.

Private George Harris was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Harris' next of kin in England (Scroll & Plaque returned to England for issue (Scroll January 1922 & Plaque November, 1921).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private George Harris – service number 3085, of 3rd Battalion, Australian Infantry. No family details are listed.

Private G. Harris is commemorated on the Roll of Honour, located in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 36.




Roll Of Honour WW1 Australian War Memorial Canberra, Australia



#### Commonwealth War Graves Commission

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission cares for cemeteries and memorials in 23,000 locations, in 153 countries. In all 1.7 million men and women from the Commonwealth forces from WWI and WWII have been honoured and commemorated in perpetuity.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission, as part of its mandate, is responsible for commemorating all Commonwealth war dead individually and equally. To this end, the war dead are commemorated by name on a headstone, at an identified site of a burial, or on a memorial. War dead are commemorated uniformly and equally, irrespective of military or civil rank, race or creed.

Not all service personnel have a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone. In some instances the relative chose to have their own memorial/headstone placed on the deceased's grave. These private headstones are not maintained by the CWGC as they have no jurisdiction to maintain them.

Private George Harris has a shared Private Family Headstone.

# Hither Green Cemetery, London, England (also known as Lee Cemetery, Lewisham Crematorium & Verdant Lane Cemetery)

There are 42 Commonwealth burials of the 1914-1918 war and 198 of the 1939-1945 war here. Those whose graves are not marked by headstones are named on a Screen Wall memorial in the main War Plot. The are also 12 non war service burials here.


