Edward Robert (Eddie) HEARLE

Edward Robert Hearle was born at Kensington, Victoria in 1895 to parents James Reed Hearle & Jane Hearle (nee Dillend).

Edward Robert Hearle attended the State School at Kensington, Victoria.

Edward Hearle was a 20 year old, single, Printer from 98 Ormond Street, Kensington, Victoria when he enlisted on 19th June, 1915 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 2599 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs J. K. Hearle, 98 Ormond Street, Kensington, Victoria. Edward Hearle stated on his Attestation Papers that he has served with Citizen Forces & the City of Melbourne Regiment – 64th Infantry for 2 years.

As Edward Robert Hearle was under the age of 21 years – his parents were required to sign their consent for their son to enlist in the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.) for active service abroad. Both parents signed their consent on 19th June, 1915.

Private Edward Hearle was posted to Depot Battalion on 23rd June, 1915 for recruit training. He was transferred to 8th Reinforcements of 5th Battalion on 1st July, 1915.

Private Edward Hearle embarked from Melbourne, Victoria on SS *Makarini* on 15th September, 1915 with the 5th Infantry Battalion, 8th Reinforcements.

Private Edward Hearle was taken on strength of 5th Battalion at Tel-el-Kebir on 7th January, 1916.

Private Edward Hearle was sent to Field Ambulance at Serapeum on 23rd January, 1916 & rejoined his Battalion on 2nd February, 1916.

Private Edward Hearle was transferred from 5th Battalion to 57th Battalion on 17th February, 1916. He was taken on strength of 57th Battalion at Serapeum on 17th February, 1916.

Private Edward Hearle was transferred to 58th Battalion on 15th March, 1916. He was taken on strength of 58th Battalion at Tel-el-Kebir on 15th March, 1916.

Private Edward Hearle embarked from Alexandria to join B.E.F. (British Expeditionary Force) on 17th June, 1916 on *Transylvania*. He disembarked at Marseilles, France on 23rd June, 1916.

Private Edward Hearle was wounded in action in France on 16th July, 1916. He was admitted to No.1 Australian Casualty Clearing Station on 16th July, 1916 with G.S.W. (gunshot wound/s) to shoulder. Private Hearle was transferred to Ambulance Train then admitted to 3rd Canadian Stationary Hospital at Boulogne, France on 17th July, 1916 with S.W. (shrapnel wound/s) to right shoulder & compound fracture. He was invalided to England on Hospital Ship *Jan Breydel* on 18th July, 1916.

58th Battalion

The 58th Battalion was raised in Egypt on 17 February 1916 as part of the expansion of the AIF. Roughly half of its recruits were Gallipoli veterans from the 6th Battalion, and the other half, fresh reinforcements from Australia. Reflecting the composition of the 6th, the 58th was predominantly composed of men from Victoria. The battalion became part of the 15th Brigade of the 5th Australian Division.

Having only arrived in France on 23 June, the 58th became embroiled in its first major battle on the Western Front at Fromelles on 19 July. The battle was a disaster. The 58th had the dual role of providing carrying parties and a reserve force. The reserve force (approximately half of the battalion) was ordered to attack late in the battle and was virtually annihilated by machine-gun fire; as a whole, the 58th suffered casualties equal to almost a third of its strength. Despite the grievous losses in its battalions, the 5th Division continued to man the front in the Fromelles sector for a further two months.

War Diary – 58th Battalion

16th July, 1916 - In the Field:

After cessation of bombardment about 12.30 am A & B Cos moved into ground occupied by C & D of 57 Bn on their right & took our C & D then moved into positions previously held by A & B. C & D's positions then taken over by Oxford & Bucks Regiment. Wounded & dead being evacuated all day. Lt Pullen wounded in leg.

Private Edward Hearle was admitted to Kitchener Hospital, Brighton, Sussex, England on 18th July, 1916 wounded – severe with a fracture of scapula compound.



Private Edward Robert Hearle died on 21st July, 1916 at Kitchener Hospital, Brighton, Sussex, England from wounds received in action in France – GSW to Scapula followed by Septicaemia. (Note: some forms have cause of death as "GSW Back".)

A death for Edward Hearle, aged 21, was registered in the September quarter, 1916 in the district of Brighton, Sussex, England.

Private Edward Robert Hearle was buried in Brighton City (Bear Road) Cemetery, East Sussex, England – Plot number ZIX.8 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

Private E. R. Hearle requested in his Will that all his property & effects be equally divided between Mrs J. R. Hearle and Miss S. Hearle.

A War Pension was granted to Jane Hearle, of Ormond Rd, Kensington, mother of the late Private Edward Hearle, in the sum of 24/- per fortnight from 25th September, 1916.


Base Records contacted Mrs J. R. Hearle, of 98 Ormond Street, Kensington, Victoria, mother of the late Private Edward Hearle, in April, 1920 stating that she was noted as the registered next-of-kin but desired to know if there

were any nearer blood relatives than herself & specifically asked if his father was alive due to the "Deceased Soldiers Estates Act 1918" which stated that the War Medals & Mementoes of a deceased soldier were to be handed in the following order of relationship – Widow, eldest surviving son, eldest surviving daughter, father, mother, eldest surviving brother, eldest surviving sister etc. Mrs J. R. Hearle replied stating that her son's father – James Reed Hearle was alive & his address was 2 Mackay Avenue, Glen Huntley. She also advised "please note change of address from Kensington."

Private Edward Robert Hearle was entitled to 1914/15 Star, British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Hearle's father – Mr J. R. Hearle, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent September, 1921 & Plaque sent July, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Edward Robert Hearle – service number 2599, of 58th Battalion, Australian Infantry. He was the son of James Reed Hearle and Jane Hearle, of 2 Mackay Avenue, Glen Huntley, Victoria.

E. R. Hearle is remembered in the Book of Remembrance at the Shrine of Remembrance, Melbourne, Victoria.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

Brighton City (Bear Road) Cemetery, East Sussex, England

The cemetery is on the Lewes road. It was opened in 1857, and now covers 44 acres. It climbs the hill Eastward, crossing a public road. A War Cross stands in the cemetery.

There are 275 Commonwealth burials of the 1914-1918 war and a further 102 of the 1939-1945 war commemorated in this site. The 1939-45 commemorations include 3 unidentified Merchant seamen and 1 unidentified British soldier. There are also 40 Foreign National war burials here and 4 non-war service burials.
