# **Neil (Jack) MACAULAY**

Neil MacAulay was born at Little Hampton, Victoria in September, 1886 to parents Hughie John and Susan Elizabeth MacAulay (nee Alcorn).

Neil MacAulay attended school at Little Hampton, Victoria.

Hughie John MacAulay, father of Neil MacAulay, died in 1908 at Collie, Western Australia.

The 1910 Australian Electoral Roll for the division of Swan, subdivision of Collie, Western Australia recorded Neil MacAulay, Grocer's Assistant, from Forrest Street, Collie.

Neil MacAulay married Alice Lyford in 1916 in Victoria.

Neil MacAulay was a 29 year old, married, Grocer from Collie, Western Australia when he enlisted on 10th January, 1916 at Maribyrnong, Victoria with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 15128 & his religion was Presbyterian. His next of kin was listed as his wife – Mrs A. MacAulay, care of Mrs Bugg, 20 Marian Street, Ascot Vale, Victoria. Neil MacAulay stated on his Attestation Papers that he had served with Cameron Highlanders as a Volunteer for 3 years in Western Australia. (Note: His name was recorded as Niel Macaulay on the Embarkation Roll & also some Attestation Papers)

Private Neil MacAulay was posted to 42nd Depot Battalion, 3rd Platoon on 10th January, 1916 for recruit training. He was transferred to "D Sub" Field Artillery Reinforcements on 26th January, 1916 with the rank of Gunner. Gunner MacAulay was transferred to Field Artillery Reinforcements on 12th February, 1916 then transferred to 25th Howitzer Brigade, 2nd Reinforcements on 1st April, 1916.

Gunner Neil MacAulay embarked from Melbourne, Victoria on HMAT *Port Lincoln (A17)* on 4th May, 1916 with the 25th Howitzer Brigade, 2nd Reinforcements.

Alice MacAulay wrote to Defence Department on 11th June, 1917 to advise her change of address from 20 Miriam Street, Ascot Vale, Melbourne where she was living when her husband No. 15128 Gunner Neil MacAulay left for active service to c/o Mrs Lyford, Wybalena Rd, Hunters Hill, NSW.

Gunner Neil MacAulay joined Artillery Training Depot at Tel-el-Kebir (no date recorded). He embarked from Alexandria on 1st August, 1916 on *Lake Manitoba* to join B.E.F. (British Expeditionary Force).

Gunner Neil MacAulay was taken on strength of No. 1 Command Depot at Perham Downs, Wiltshire, England on 25th September, 1916 & was classified as B1A (temporarily unfit for Active Service).

The Hospital Admissions form recorded Gunner Neil MacAulay was posted to No. 4 Command Depot on 28th October, 1916 with his "*Arm hurt by horse and pneumonia.*" He was medically classified on 12th November & 24th November, 1916 as B1 A3 (fit for Overseas Training Camp in 2 – 3 weeks). Gunner MacAulay was medically classified on 1st December, 1916 as B1 A4 (fit for Overseas Training Camp when passed dentally fit.)

Gunner Neil MacAulay was marched out to No. 7 Camp in England on 24th December, 1916 from Infantry Draft Depot at Perham Downs.

Gunner Neil MacAulay proceeded overseas to France via Folkestone on 8th January, 1917 on *Princess Henrietta* from 3rd Divisional Artillery Details. He was marched in the A.G.B.D. (Australian General Base Depot) at Etaples, France on 9th January, 1917.

Gunner Neil MacAulay was transferred to 3rd Divisional Artillery on 8th February, 1917 & was taken on strength of 7th Field Artillery Brigade – 27th Battery in the Field on the same day.

Gunner Neil MacAulay was mustered as Driver with 7th Field Artillery Brigade on 18th May, 1917.

The address details for the next-of-kin of Driver Neil MacAulay were changed on 30th June, 1917 to show Mrs A. Macaulay c/o Mrs Lyford, Wybalena Rd, Hunters Hill, N.S.W.

Driver Neil MacAulay was admitted to 9th Australian Field Ambulance on 28th November, 1917 with Trench Fever. He was transferred & admitted to 2nd Australian Casualty Clearing Station on 29th November, 1917 then transferred to Ambulance Train 34 on 2nd December, 1917. Driver MacAulay was admitted to 35th General Hospital at Calais, France on 2nd December, 1917 with Nephritis. He was transferred to England on 7th December, 1917.

Driver Neil MacAulay was admitted to Auxiliary Military Hospital, Southall, England (affiliated to Edmonton Military Hospital) on 7th December, 1917 with Nephritis. The Hospital Admissions form recorded "Great deal of albumen present on admission. Uraemic fits started Jan 1st."

Mrs A. Macaulay, c/o Mrs Lyford, Wybalena Rd, Hunters Hill, NSW, was advised by Base Records on 28th December, 1917 that Gunner N. MacAulay had been admitted to Auxiliary Military Hospital, Southall, England on 7th December, 1917 suffering from Nephritis.

Driver Neil MacAulay died at 7 am on 3rd January, 1918 Southall V.A.D. Hospital, Southall, England from 1. Acute Nephritis & 2. Uraemia. The Hospital Admissions form recorded "died Jan 3rd 18 in a fit."

Driver Neil MacAulay was buried at 1.30 pm on 5th January, 1918 in Brookwood Military Cemetery, Surrey, England – Australian Military Burial Ground - Plot number 180314.

From the burial report of Driver Neil MacAulay - Coffin was good, Polished Elm with brass fittings. The deceased soldier was accorded a Military Funeral. The coffin was draped with the Australian Flag. Firing Party, Bugler and Pallbearers were supplied by the Administrative Headquarters, A.I.F. London. The grave will be turfed immediately, and an oak cross will be erected by the A.I.F. London. No relatives were present at the funeral. Administrative Headquarters, A.I.F. London were represented at the funeral.

Base Records wrote to Mrs A. Macaulay, William Street, Turramurra, NSW on 6th April, 1923 stating that the site of Driver N. Macaulay's grave in Brookwood Military Cemetery had been officially registered as Plot 11 Row A Grave 11

This is now recorded by CWGC as Memorial reference – XI. A. 11. Driver Neil MacAulay now has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

The Red Cross Wounded & Missing file for Driver Neil MacAulay contains a letter from The Matron, Auxiliary Military V.A.D. Hospital, Southall, England which reads: "Re Pte Macauley. He was admitted on Dec. 7th suffering very badly from Nephritis. He gradually became worse and on the 1st January at noon he had a Uraemic fit and continued having them gradually becoming weaker, ON the 2nd he became unconscious and did not recover consciousness again, dying quite quietly suffering no pain at 7 am on the 3rd of January. He was buried by the Aust: Government at Brookwood Cemetery (in a piece of ground bought by the Aust: Government so that Australians should be buried together) on Saturday 5th. It is with deep regret I have to write this and offer my sincere sympathy t the relations of Pte Macauley."

Neil MacAulay requested in his Will dated 21st June, 1917 that all his real estate & personal estate be bequeathed to his wife – Alice Macaulay, c/o G. Lyford, Wybalina Rd, Hunters Hill, Sydney, Australia.

The 2nd Military District, Victoria Barracks, Paddington, Sydney, advised Base Records on 16th February, 1918 that Mrs Alice MacAulay, next of kin of No. 15128 Gunner Neil MacAulay, 25th Howitzer Brigade, was living at "Clare," William Street, Sydney.

A War Pension was granted to Alice Macaulay, William Street, Turramurra, widow of the late Gunner (as listed on Pension records) Neil MacAulay, 7th F.A.B., in the sum of £2 per fortnight from 8th March, 1918.

Alice Macaulay wrote to Base Records on 9th March, 1918 asking if they held "my late husband's Will as he made one out while in France about nine months ago, or where could I apply for it". She also advised her change of address from Hunters Hill to Rowland Avenue, Warrawee, Sydney.

Driver Neil MacAulay was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Driver Macaulay's widow – Mrs A. Macaulay, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent March, 1922 & Plaque sent October, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Driver Neil MacAulay – service number 15128, aged 30, of 7th Bde., Australian Field Artillery. He was the son of Hughie and Susan MacAulay; husband of Alice MacAulay, of William St., Turramurra, New South Wales.

N. MacAulay is remembered on the Collie & Surrounding Districts Roll of Honour, located in Collie Cardiff Sub Branch Premises located in Lefroy Street, Collie, Western Australia.






N. MacAulay is remembered on the Western Australia State War Memorial which is located at the top of Kings Park and Botanic Garden escarpment, ANZAC Bluff, Fraser Avenue, Perth, Western Australia. The memorial was developed around an 18 metre tall obelisk as the principal feature, which is almost a replica of the Australian Imperial Force Memorials erected in France and Belgium.

The heavy concrete foundations are supplemented by heavy brick walls which enclose an inner chamber or crypt. The walls surrounding the crypt are covered with The Roll of Honour; marble tablets which list under their units the names of more than 7,000 members of the services killed in action or as a result of World War One.



#### Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

# **Brookwood Military Cemetery, Surrey, England**

Located 30 miles from London in Surrey, Brookwood Military Cemetery is the largest CWGC cemetery in the United Kingdom. The cemetery contains the graves of more than 1,600 servicemen of the British Empire in the First World War and over 3,470 from the Second World War.

Brookwood Military Cemetery lies adjacent to Brookwood Cemetery (The London Necropolis), a vast space which covers 500 acres. In 1917, an area to the north of the cemetery was set aside as Brookwood Military Cemetery for men and women of Commonwealth forces who died, many of battle wounds, in the London district. This site was further extended to accommodate Commonwealth casualties of the Second World War. (Information from CWGC)

There are 446 Australian War Graves in Brookwood Military Cemetery – 351 from World War 1 & 95 from World War 2.
