Charles Henry McGOLDRICK

Charles Henry McGoldrick was born at Mt. Keira, Wollongong, NSW on 16th October, 1890 to parents Charles Henry and Mary Louise McGoldrick (nee Head).

Charles Henry McGoldrick attended school at Wollongong, NSW.

Charles Henry McGoldrick married Irene Sarah Lindsay on 13th January, 1913 in St. Augustine's Church, Bulli, NSW. Their marriage was registered in the district of Woonona, NSW. Charles Henry McGoldrick was listed as a Miner & both were residing at Scarborough, NSW.

A daughter – Irene Ada McGoldrick was born in 1913 to Charles Henry & Irene Sarah McGoldrick. A daughter – Adeline Ettie McGoldrick was born in 1915 to Charles Henry & Irene Sarah McGoldrick however she died on 11th October, 1915, aged 4 ½ months.

Charles Henry McGoldrick was a 25 year old, married, Miner from Scarborough, NSW when he enlisted at Stanwell Park, NSW on 14th December, 1915 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 5183 & his religion was Roman Catholic. His next of kin was listed as his wife – Mrs S. I. McGoldrick, of Scarborough P.O., South Coast, NSW.

Charles Henry McGoldrick was posted to the "Waratahs" with the rank of Private on 14th December, 1915 for recruit training. He was transferred to "E" Company, 1st Battalion on 18th December, 1915. Pte McGoldrick was transferred on 1st March, 1916 to 16th Reinforcements of 1st Battalion.

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick embarked from Sydney, NSW on SS *Makarini* on 1st April, 1916 with the 1st Infantry Battalion, 16th Reinforcements & disembarked at Suez on 2nd May, 1916.

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick embarked from Alexandria on *Caledonia* to join B.E.F. (British Expeditionary Force) & disembarked at Marseilles, France on 17th May, 1916. He reported at 1st Australian Divisional Base Depot at Etaples, France on 20th May, 1916.

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick was admitted to 26th General Hospital at Etaples on 3rd June, 1916 with a hernia. He was discharged to duty on 11th June, 1916.

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick reported to 1st A.D.B. Depot (Australian Divisional Base) from Hospital on 11th June, 1916. He proceeded from 1st A.D.B. D. on 27th July, 1916 to join his Unit & was taken on strength of 1st Battalion in France on 27th July, 1916 from 16th Reinforcements.

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick was wounded in action in France on 18th August, 1916. He was admitted to No. 3 Casualty Clearing Station on 18th August, 1916 with gunshot wounds to knee then transferred to No. 31 Ambulance Train on 26th August, 1916. Pte McGoldrick was admitted to No. 8 Stationary Hospital on Wimereux on 27th August, 1916 with gunshot wounds to right knee. He embarked for England from Boulogne on 2nd September, 1916 on Hospital Ship *Newhaven*.

War Diary – 1st Battalion

18th August, 1916:

0900 – Received order to relieve 3rd Bn in firing line. Relief to be completed by 1500. C.O. went to Bde. Headqrs to see the Brigadier in response to telephone message. See in C went to 2rd Bn. Headqrs in firing line to arrange for the relief. This was arranged

1315 – C. Coy, already in close support proceeded at 1315 to relieve D coy 3rd Bn.

1300 - A. Coy left WIRE TRENCH to relieve A Coy 3rd Bn.

WIRE TRENCH

1315 – B. Coy proceeded by the COPSE to relieve C Coy 3rd Bn. accompanied by Bombing Platoon.

1330 – D. Coy with Headqrs L.M.G.S. & details attached to D, proceeded to trench evacuated at 1315 by our C. Coy to be in support to 1st Bn.

1530 - B. C. & D Coys reported relief completed. A. Coy impossible to communicate with owing to intervening ground being swept b artillery and M.G. fire.

1700 – No word received from A. Coy, 80 reported relief complete (except A Coy) to Bde Headqrs.

1915 – Report received from A. Coy relief complete. Reported to Bde relief completed accordingly.

2100 - Our artillery opened barrage fire. Replied to vigorously by enemy at 2110. Heavy enemy

2230 - barrage fire over our position and in front of POZIERES until 2230

2200 – Following work was carried out in 1st Bn sector from 2200 to 0400......

(Extract of War Diary from the Australian War Memorial)

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick was admitted to War Hospital, Duston, Northampton, England on 5th September, 1916 with "G.S.W. Thigh Amputated. Seriously ill". He was reported as having Pneumonia & "Not yet out of danger" (No date recorded).

Mrs Sarah Irene McGoldrick, wife of Private Charles Henry McGoldrick, was advised that her husband had been wounded on 14th September, 1916. She was advised on the 19th September, 1916 that her husband had been admitted to the Northampton War Hospital on 1st September with gunshot wound to thigh – Severe. Mrs McGoldrick was advised on 20th September, 1916 that her husband was seriously ill "Gunshot wound Thigh amputated and Pneumonia." Mrs McGoldrick was advised on 25th September, 1916 that her husband's condition was stationary.

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick died on 16th September, 1916 at War Hospital, Duston, Northampton, Northamptonshire, England from wounds received in action in France – Gunshot wounds to right thigh amputated & Pneumonia.

A death for Charles H. McGoldrick, aged 26, was registered in the September quarter, 1916 in the district of Northampton, Northamptonshire, England.

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick was buried on 22nd September, 1916 in Towcester Road Cemetery, Northampton, Northamptonshire, England – Plot number 448.2.17399 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

MrsMcGoldrick, widow of the late Private Charles Henry McGoldrick, wrote to Base Records in October, 1916 stating that "enclosed herewith find sundry papers reporting my husband...... as seriously wounded and since then officially reported as having died. I feel that there is a very great difference in the dates as officially given as to when wounded also in comparison with the cable despatched signed by him as doing well at date of sending viz 31st August last. I shall be very grateful if your Office will make another enquiry as to the accuracy of the information...." Base Records replied on 2nd November, 1916 stating "it is regretted that as the dates given do not disclose any discrepancies, the expense of cabling an enquiry would not be warranted in this case. He is reported as having died on 16th September, 1916, and his last message to you is date 31st August."

A War Pension was granted to Sarah Irene McGoldrick, widow of the late Private Charles Henry McGoldrick, in the sum of £2 per fortnight from 28th November, 1916. A Pension was also granted to Irene Lavena Ada McGoldrick, daughter of the late Private Charles Henry McGoldrick, in the sum of £1 per fortnight from 28th November, 1916.

Private Charles Henry McGoldrick was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte McGoldrick's widow – Mrs S. I. McGoldrick, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent October, 1921 & Plaque sent January, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Charles Henry McGoldrick – service number 5183, aged 25, of 1st Battalion, Australian Infantry. He was the son of Charles Henry and Mary McGoldrick; husband of Sarah Irene McGoldrick, of Port Kembla, New South Wales.

C. H. McGoldrick is remembered on the Coalcliff, Scarborough, Clifton Roll of Honour, located at Scarborough Public School, Lawrence Hargrave Drive, Scarborough, NSW.

Description

Studio portrait of 5183 Private (Pte) Charles Henry McGoldrick, 1st Battalion, of Scarborough, NSW with his wife Irene Sarah McGoldrick and daughter Irene Ada. A miner before enlisting in December 1915, Pte McGoldrick left Australia with the 16th Reinforcements in April 1916 for service on the Western Front. He was wounded at Wire Trench, near Pozieres on 18 August 1916, and was evacuated to England where he succumbed to his wounds on 16 September 1916, age 25. At the time the portrait was taken, Irene Sarah McGoldrick was pregnant with their second daughter, Adeline, who died as an infant the same month as her father.

Description

A photo montage of descendants of the late Benjamin Rixon of Illawarra who served in the First World War. Benjamin Rixon was the son of convicts James Rixon, who arrived in New South Wales in 1798 and Amelia Goodwin, who arrived in 1800. He was one of two surviving triplets, the first white triplets to be born in Australia and who were featured on the front page of the Sydney Gazette on Saturday January 19, 1806. Almost all the men depicted are great-grandsons of Rixon. The collage was published on the front of the Sydney Mail on 24 July, 1918. Tpr Bertie Rixon was killed in action three weeks later on 14 July 1918. The production of the photo montage was initiated in 1918 by Margaret Lucinda Salisbury of Woonona, Wollongong, NSW, a granddaughter of Benjamin Rixon.

McGOLDRICK. — Died of wounds received at the Battle of Pozieres, Sept. 16, 1916, Private C. H. McGoldrick, dearly-beloved husband of R. McGoldrick, and father of little Eileen, in his 25th year.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government. (Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921)

A letter from Base Records, dated 25th July, 1921, to Mrs S. I. McGoldrick, Scarborough, South Coast, NSW, advised that a letter from the Defence Dept. concerning an inscription on the headstone of her husband - the late Pte C. H. McGoldrick had not been answered & non-receipt of a reply within 21 days would have to be accepted as indicating that no further action was to be taken.

Private C. H. McGoldrick does have a personal inscription on his headstone.

Northampton (Towcester Road) Cemetery contains 116 First World War burials and 17 from the Second World War, most of which form a combined war graves plot to the left of the chapel. The cemetery also contains five non-war service burials and three Czech war graves.




