Victor Thomas O'GRADY

Victor Thomas O'Grady was born at Gladstone Street, Fullarton Estate, South Australia on 15th June, 1897 to parents Thomas Patrick and Violet Isabel O'Grady (nee Fraser). His birth was registered in the district of Adelaide, South Australia. Victor Thomas O'Grady was baptised on 19th September, 1897 at St. Oswald's Church, Parkside, South Australia. (Place of birth was listed as Unley, South Australia on his Attestation Papers).

Victor Thomas O'Grady attended Unley School & High School & School of Mines. He also attended Roseworthy Agricultural College from April, 1914 until March, 1917. He was awarded Roseworthy Diploma in Agriculture RDA.

Victor Thomas O'Grady was a 20 year old Civil Servant from Roseworthy College, South Australia when he enlisted on 3rd August, 1917 in Adelaide, South Australia with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 7531 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs V. L. O'Grady, of Sea View Road, Grange, South Australia. Victor O'Grady stated on his Attestation Papers that he had served with Senior Cadets for 2 years.

As Victor Thomas O'Grady was aged under 21 years - his parents were required to sign their consent for their son to enlist in the Australian Imperial Force for Active Service abroad. Violet I O'Grady signed her consent for her son to enlist for active service on 3rd August, 1917.

Private Victor Thomas O'Grady was posted to "B" Company at Mitcham Camp from 31st August, 1917 for recruit training. He was transferred to 25th Reinforcements of 10th Battalion on 12th September, 1917.

10th Battalion

The 10th Battalion was among the first infantry units raised for the AIF during the First World War. The battalion was recruited in South Australia, and together with the 9th, 11th and 12th Battalions, formed the 3rd Brigade....

Private Victor Thomas O'Grady embarked from Melbourne, Victoria on HMAT *Aeneas (A60)* on 30th October, 1917 with the 10th Infantry Battalion, 25th Reinforcements & disembarked at Devonport, England on 27th December, 1917.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Victor Thomas O'Grady was marched in to 2nd Training Battalion at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire from Australia on 27th December, 1917.

Private Victor Thomas O'Grady was sent sick to Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 4th February, 1918. He was admitted the same day with Measles.

Private Victor Thomas O'Grady was admitted to Salisbury Isolation Hospital, Wiltshire on 13th February, 1918 from Sutton Veny.

Private Victor Thomas O'Grady died at 11.10 pm on 14th February, 1918 at Isolation Hospital, Salisbury, Wiltshire, England from Cerebro Spinal Fever.

A death for Victor O'Grady, aged 20, was registered in the March quarter, 1918 in the district of Salisbury, Wiltshire, England.

Private Victor Thomas O'Grady was buried on 18th February, 1918 in St Lawrence's Churchyard, Stratford-sub-Castle, Wiltshire, England – Plot number 131 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone. From the burial report of Private Victor Thomas O'Grady - Coffin was good polished Elm. Military Funeral. Comrades of Pte O'Grady have ordered a headstone to be placed on the grave.


Private Victor Thomas O'Grady requested in his Will, dated 12th October, 1917 that all his property, including his Military Estate, be given to his mother – Violet Isabel O'Grady, of Seaview Road, Grange, South Australia. Violet O'Grady was also appointed as sole executrix.

A War Pension was granted to Violet Isabel O'Grady, of Sea View Rd, Grange. widowed mother of the late Private Victor Thomas O'Grady, in the sum of £2 per fortnight from 18th April, 1918.

Private Victor Thomas O'Grady was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private O'Grady's widowed mother – Mrs V. I. O'Grady, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent July, 1921 & Plaque sent October, 1922).







Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

St Lawrence's Churchyard, Stratford-sub-Castle, Wiltshire, England

During the two world wars, the United Kingdom became an island fortress used for training troops and launching land, sea and air operations around the globe. There are more than 170,000 Commonwealth war graves in the United Kingdom, many being those of servicemen and women killed on active service, or who later succumbed to wounds. Others died in training accidents, or because of sickness or disease. The graves, many of them privately owned and marked by private memorials, will be found in more than 12,000 cemeteries and churchyards. Most of the 47 First World War burials in Stratford-sub-Castle (St Lawrence) Churchyard were made from the local hospital and more than half of them are of Australian servicemen who were based at the many Australian depots and training camps in the area. There are also two burials of the Second World War in the cemetery. (*Information from CWGC*)



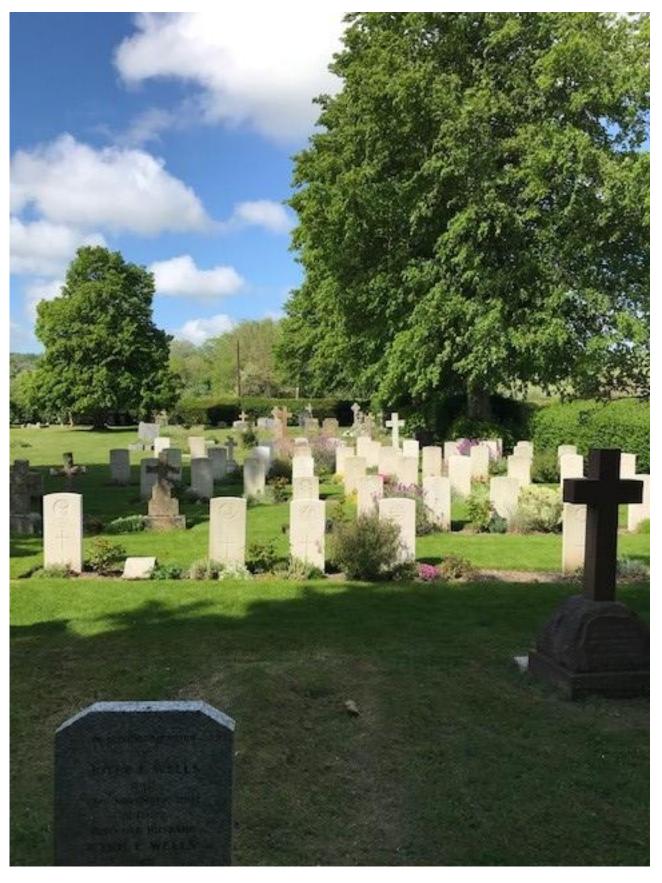


