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## Norman George PEUT

Norman George Peut was born at Normanton, North Queensland on 15<sup>th</sup> January, 1888 to parents Peter & Ellen Peut (nee Von-Dohen). He was a 29 year old, single, Labourer from Sydney, NSW when he enlisted at Recruiting Depot, Royal Naval House, Grosvenor Street, Sydney on 16<sup>th</sup> November, 1917 with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Infantry Battalion, 26<sup>th</sup> Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 7763 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs Ellen Peut, Post Office, Ingham, Queensland.

Private Norman George Peut embarked from Sydney on HMAT *Ulysses (A38)* on 19<sup>th</sup> December, 1917 & disembarked at Port Suez on 16<sup>th</sup> January, 1918. He re-embarked at Port Said on 24<sup>th</sup> January, 1918 on *Leasowe Castle* & disembarked at Taranto, Italy on 2<sup>nd</sup> February, 1918. Pte Peut then entrained from Taranto on 5<sup>th</sup> February, 1918 to Cherbourg, France, arriving on 12<sup>th</sup> February, 1918. He embarked from Cherbourg on 12<sup>th</sup> February aboard HMT *Antrim* & disembarked at Southampton, England on 13<sup>th</sup> February, 1918.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Norman George Peut was marched in from Australia to 1<sup>st</sup> Training Battalion at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 13<sup>th</sup> February, 1918.

Private Norman George Peut was sent sick to Sutton Veny Hospital with Influenza on 3<sup>rd</sup> March, 1918 & admitted to the Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 4<sup>th</sup> March, 1918.

Private Norman George Peut died on 9th March, 1918 at the Military Hospital, Sutton Veny of "New growth. Malignant left bronchus". Cause of death was verified by Post Mortem.

A death for Norman G. P<u>ue</u>t, aged 30, was registered in the March quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Private Norman George Peut was buried on 13<sup>th</sup> March, 1918 in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 326. From the burial report of Pte Peut - *Coffin was good condition, polished wood* – *The full band of the 1<sup>st</sup> Training Battalion preceded the funeral party, which consisted of a firing party of 12 men, and a number of personal friends of the deceased. A very fine wreath presented by the comrades of the late Pte Peut, N. G. was placed on the grave. The deceased soldier was popular with both officers and men in this battalion.* 

Pte Norman George Peut requested in his Will dated 8<sup>th</sup> December, 1917 that all his real & personal Estate be left to his mother – Ellen Peut.

A cousin – Miss Kate Bopf of Hill Street, Taringa, Brisbane, had written to Base Records on 13<sup>th</sup> April, 1918 enquiring into the death of her cousin, Pte Peut. She was advised of the details of her cousin's death.

A package containing the personal effects of Pte Peut were sent to his mother in October, 1918 & in February, 1919 two photographs of Pte Peut's grave were sent to his mother.

Pte Norman George Peut was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a theatre of war. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also to be sent to Pte Peut's closest next-of-kin – his father. Base Records had written to Mrs Peut in June, 1921 asking if Pte Peut's father was still living as he would be the next-of-kin eligible to receive the medal. The letter was not answered & Base records again wrote to Mrs Peut in May, 1923, at the same address, asking if the address was correct before sending out the mementos. Pte Peut's War Medal & Memorial Scroll & Plaque were sent to Untraceables section in November, 1922.

In November, 1923 Base Records made an enquiry to Dept. of Repatriation to see if any pension was being paid on account of late Pte Norman George Peut. No claim had been made for the War Gratuity in the case of Pte Peut & no War Pension was being paid. Private N. G. Peut is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 34.

#### Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

(Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921)

A letter was sent from Base Records to Mrs Peut, dated 27<sup>th</sup> July, 1921, advising that a communication from the Defence Department concerning an inscription that could be placed on her son's Headstone in the Churchyard of Sutton Veny had not yet been replied to. The letter advised that if no reply was received within 21 days, it would be taken as indicating that no further action was required.

Pte Norman George Peut does not have a personal inscription on his headstone.
