Robert TATLER

Robert Henry Tatler was born at Newington, London, England in 1887 to parents Robert & Amelia Tatler. His birth was registered in the December quarter, 1887 in the district of St. Saviour Southwark, London. Robert Henry Tatler was baptised on 10th February, 1888 at St. John's Church, Walworth, Surrey, England. The family lived at 37 Heygate St & his father – Robert was listed as a Warehouseman.

The 1891 England Census recorded Robert Tatler as a 3 year old, living with his family at 6 Manor Place, Newington, London, England. His parents were listed as Robert C. Tatler (Warehouseman, aged 28, born Portsmouth) & Amelia Tatler (aged 30, born Stepney, London). Robert was the eldest of three children liste don this Census (all born Newington, London) – Robert, then Alfred (aged 2) & Charles (aged 1 month). Also listed was a visitor – Richard Lane (Coachman, aged 26, born Portland, Dorset).

[The 1911 England Census recorded Robert's parents Robert henry Tatler & Amelia Tatler along with 3 children – (Charles Richard Tatler, May Priscilla Tatler & Maud Amelia Tatler) living at 12a Brithannia Chamber, Gt Dover St, St Mary Newington, London & Surrey, England.]

Robert Tatler was a 27 year old, single, Stacker when he enlisted at Liverpool, Sydney, New South Wales on 30th October, 1914 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 1433 (as per Embarkation Roll) & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs Amelia Tatler, 17 York Street, Walworth, London, England. Robert Tatler's younger brother – Charles Richard Tatler also enlisted on the same day (service number 1432).

[Note: The Commonwealth War Graves Commission records Private Robert Tatler's Service number as 1289 on their website, yet had Service number 1433 engraved on his CWGC Headstone. <u>Update</u> – Headstone has been changed to show Service number 1289.

The Australian War Memorial records Private Robert Tatler on their Roll of Honour with a Service number of 1289; the Embarkation Roll with a Service Number of 1433 & the Nominal Roll with a Service number of 1289.

The National Archives of Australia has recorded Private Robert Tatler's Service Record file under Service number 1289.

Attestation Papers & other forms in Private Robert Tatler's Service Record file show Service Numbers 1433 & 1289.

An email was sent to CWGC, AWM & National Archives Australia at the time of researching – suggesting that both Service numbers be listed against Private Robert Tatler's name.]

Private Robert Tatler was posted to A.I.F. 2nd Reinforcements of 1st Battalion on 30th October, 1914 for recruit training.

Private Robert Tatler & his brother Private Charles Richard Tatler embarked from Sydney, New South Wales on HMAT Seang Bee (A48) on 11th February, 1915 with the 1st Infantry Battalion, 2nd Reinforcements.

Private Robert Tatler embarked from Alexandria on 5th April, 1915 on *Minnewaska* to join M.E.F. (Mediterranean Expeditionary Force) – Gallipoli Campaign.

Private Robert Tatler was wounded at Gallipoli on 11th May, 1915. He was admitted to Hospital Ship *Gascon* on 11th May, 1915 with G.S.W. (gunshot wound/s) to right Shoulder -severe.

1st Battalion

The 1st Battalion was the first infantry unit recruited for the AIF in New South Wales during the First World War. The battalion was raised within a fortnight of the declaration of war in August 1914 and embarked just two months

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later. After a brief stop in Albany, Western Australia, the battalion proceeded to Egypt, arriving on 2 December. The battalion took part in the ANZAC landing on 25 April 1915 as part of the second and third waves, and served there until the evacuation in December.



Private Robert Tatler died on 25th June, 1915 at Royal Victoria Hospital, Netley, Southampton, Hampshire, England from Wounds received in Action at Gallipoli.

A death for Robert Tatler, aged 27, was registered in the June quarter, 1915 in the district of South Stoneham, Hampshire, England.

Private Robert Tatler was buried in Wandsworth (Earlsfield) Cemetery, London, England – Plot number Aust. 32 and now has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

Private Robert Tatler requested in his Will dated 12th April, 1915: "I Robert Tatler leave to Amelia Tatler, May Tatler and Maud Tatler, all of 17 York St, Walworth, London, England. One third each of all moneys due to me from the Commonwealth Government and Com. Savings Bank a/c No 12969."

Private Robert Tatler was entitled to 1914/15 Star, British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Tatler's mother in England – Mrs A. Tatler, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll & Plaque issued in England in October, 1921). (Note: Amelia Tatler had died in the June quarter, 1921 at Lambeth, London, England).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Robert Tatler – service number 1289, aged 27, of 1st Battalion, Australian Infantry. No family details are listed.

Private R. Tatler is commemorated on the Roll of Honour, located in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 31.

Information provided for the Roll of honour was normally completed by the next-of-kin. In Private Tatler's case the information was compiled by "Official Historian's Staff." The next-of-kin was listed as C. R. Tatler – brother of 148 Queens Street, Woollahra, New South Wales.

On 14 Sept. 1914, during the Battle of the Aisne, while leading his company through thickly wooded country he was seriously wounded by a party of Germans upon whom they came suddenly. Owing to heavy shell fire

Walworth, 30 Oct. 1891; joined the Australian Contingent on the outbreak of war; died at Netley Hospital, Southampton, 25 June, 1915; unm.

[NOTE: Date of birth in de Ruvigny's Roll of Honour is listed incorrectly as 30th October, 1891. Robert Henry Tatler was baptised in 1888]

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Connected to Private Robert Tatler:

Younger brother Charles Richard Tatler – Enlisted in the A.I.F. on 30th October, 1914, as a 23 year old, single Boot Trade. He embarked from Sydney, New South Wales on HMAT *Seang Bee (A48)* on 11th February, 1915 with the 1st Infantry Battalion, 2nd Reinforcements as Private 1432.

Wounded 25 – 30th April, 1915 – bullet wound to Leg at Dardanelles. Rejoined his Unit on 20th September, 1916.

Appointed Lance Corporal on 26th October, 1916.

To be Returned to Australia as part of 1915 Personnel from 14th December, 1918. Discharged from Australian Imperial Force in Sydney, NSW on 31st March, 1919.

Entitled to 1914/15 Star, British War Medal & Victory Medal.

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Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

(Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921)

Private R. Tatler does not have a personal inscription on his headstone.

Wandsworth (Earlsfield) Cemetery, London

This is to the North-East of Earlsfield Station and is bounded by the Magdalen Road on the East and the main railway line on the West.

It contains five 1914-1918 War Plots, (the general Military Plot, the Australian, the Newfoundland, the New Zealand and the South African plots). These are on the main path leading West from Magdalen Road and there are also over 200 burials in other parts of the cemetery. The Military Plot contains a Screen Wall bearing the names of those buried in it and those in unmarked graves in other parts of the cemetery. The majority of the 1939-1945 burials are scattered throughout the cemetery but there is one group of six burials together in a War Plot near the main entrance. Again, those whose graves are unmarked are also named upon the Screen Wall, Panel 1.

Many of the 1914-1918 burials are from the 3rd London General Hospital which was at Wandsworth. There are 477 Commonwealth burials of the 1914-1918 war and 115 of the 1939-1945 war here. There are also 5 non-war service burials here.

There are 34 Australian World War 1 Soldiers buried here & 1 Australian Soldier from 1925. (Information from CWGC)


