## **William Samuel THORSBY**

William Samuel Thorsby was born at Murrurundi, New South Wales in 1872 to parents William Samuel and Elizabeth Thorsby (nee Wright).

William Samuel Thorsby attended school at Tamworth, NSW.

William Samuel Thorsby married Charlotte Newman in the district of Tamworth, NSW in 1902.

William & Charlotte Newman had the following children (their births were registered in the district of Tamworth, NSW): Florence A. Thorsby (born 1902; died 1903); Melba Elizabeth Patricia Thorsby (born 1904); Edna Nellie Thorsby (born 1905); William Samuel Thorsby (born 1907); Doris E. Thorsby (born 1909); Olive Maude "Ol" Thorsby (born 1910) & Mary R. Thorsby (born 1913; died 1914).

William Samuel Thorsby was a 44 year old, married, Cook & Baker from West Tamworth, NSW when he enlisted at Tamworth, NSW on 9th May, 1917 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 6946 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his wife – Mrs Charlotte Thorsby, Church Street, West Tamworth, NSW.

Private William Samuel Thorsby was posted to R.A.S.G. (Royal Agricultural Show Ground) at Sydney, NSW on 12th May, 1917 for recruit training. He was transferred to "E" Company, 1st Depot Battalion at Liverpool, Sydney, NSW on 28th June, 1917.

Private William Samuel Thorsby embarked from Sydney, NSW on HMAT *Port Melbourne (A16)* on 16th July, 1917 with the 20th Infantry Battalion, 20th Reinforcements & disembarked at Liverpool, NSW on 16th September, 1917.

### 20th Battalion

The 20th Battalion was raised at Liverpool in New South Wales in March 1915 as part of the 5th Brigade. A sprinkling of the 20th's original recruits had already served with the Australian Naval and Military Expeditionary Force (AN&MEF) in the operations to capture German New Guinea in 1914.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private William Samuel Thorsby was marched in to 5th Training Battalion at Rollestone, Wiltshire, England from Australia on 16th September, 1917.

Private William Samuel Thorsby was sent sick to Salisbury Isolation Hospital on 18th January, 1918 & admitted to Salisbury Isolation Hospital on 21st January, 1918 with Cerebro Spinal Fever.

Private William Samuel Thorsby died at 2.30 pm on 24th February, 1918 at Isolation Hospital, Salisbury, Wiltshire, England from Cerebro Spinal Meningitis.

A death for William S. Thorsby, aged 45, was registered in the March quarter, 1918 in the district of Salisbury, Wiltshire, England.

Private William Samuel Thorsby was buried on 27th February, 1918 in St Lawrence's Churchyard, Stratford-sub-Castle, Wiltshire, England – Plot number 133 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone. From the burial report of Private William Samuel Thorsby – *Military Funeral. Officiating Clergyman – Capt. J. F. G. Huthnance, 5th Training Battalion, Fovant, Wiltshire.* 

Private William Samuel Thorsby requested in his Will dated 28th June, 1917 that the whole of his property & effects be given to his wife – Charlotte Thorsby, Church Street, West Tamworth, NSW.

A War Pension was granted to Charlotte Thorsby, of Church Street, West Tamworth, widow of the late Private William Samuel Thorsby in the sum of £2 per fortnight from 27th April, 1918. Pensions was also granted from 27th April, 1918 to the following children of Charlotte & the late Private Thorsby – Melba Elizabeth Patricia Thorsby (£1 per fortnight); Edna Nellie Thorsby (15/- per fortnight); William Samuel Thorsby (10/- per fortnight); Doris Evelyn Thorsby (10/- per fortnight) & Olive Maud Thorsby (10/- per fortnight).


Private William Samuel Thorsby was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Thorsby's widow - Mrs C. Thorsby, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent June, 1921 & Plaque sent October, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private William Samuel Thorsby – service number 6946, aged 45, of 20th Battalion, Australian Infantry. He was the son of William Samuel and Elizabeth Thorsby.

W. S. Thorsby is remembered on the ANZAC Park Memorial Gates, 139A Brisbane Street, Tamworth, NSW.

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### Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

### St Lawrence's Churchyard, Stratford-sub-Castle, Wiltshire, England

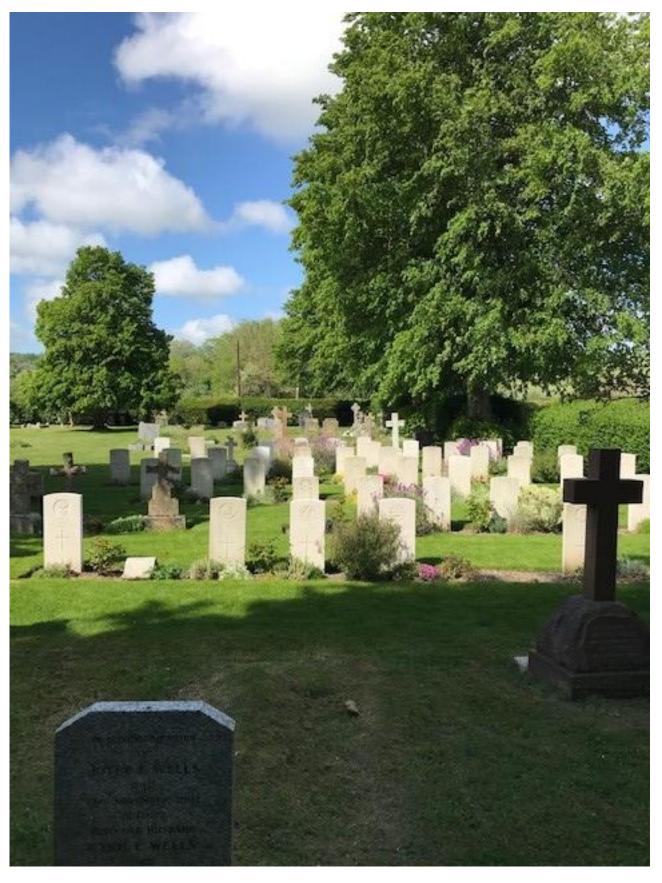
During the two world wars, the United Kingdom became an island fortress used for training troops and launching land, sea and air operations around the globe. There are more than 170,000 Commonwealth war graves in the United Kingdom, many being those of servicemen and women killed on active service, or who later succumbed to wounds. Others died in training accidents, or because of sickness or disease. The graves, many of them privately owned and marked by private memorials, will be found in more than 12,000 cemeteries and churchyards. Most of the 47 First World War burials in Stratford-sub-Castle (St Lawrence) Churchyard were made from the local hospital and more than half of them are of Australian servicemen who were based at the many Australian depots and training camps in the area. There are also two burials of the Second World War in the cemetery. (Information from CWGC)



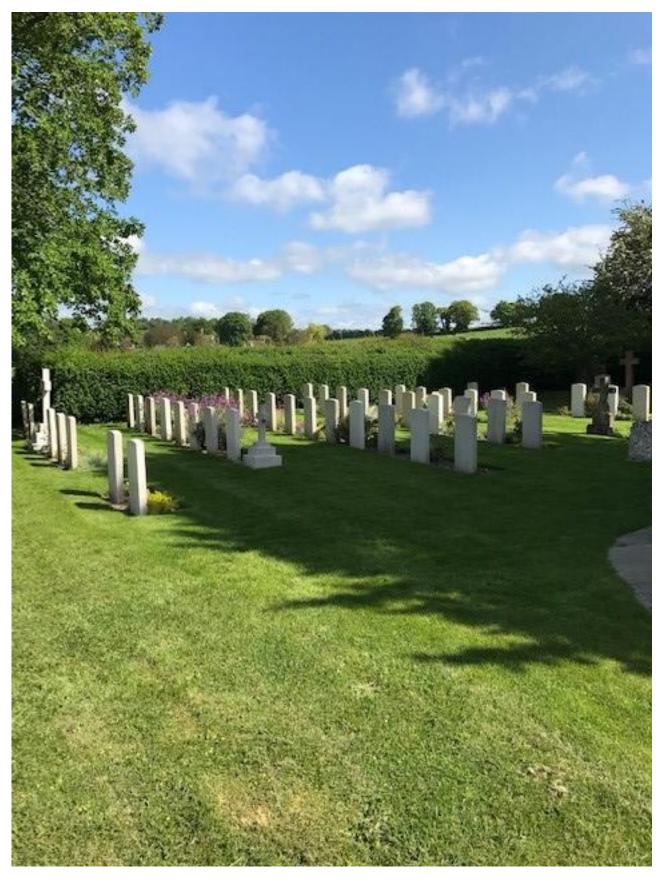
St. Lawrence Church, Stratford-sub-Castle


