Frederick Allan VINCENT

Frederick Allan Vincent was born at Burnie, Tasmania on 27th November, 1896 to parents Henry and Alison (Alice Mary) Vincent (nee Polson).

Frederick Allan Vincent attended the Covent School, Burnie, Tasmania.

Frederick Allan Vincent was a 21 year old, single, Labourer from Upper Burnie, Tasmania when he enlisted on 5th April, 1918 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 56619 & his religion was Roman Catholic. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs A. M. Vincent, Upper Burnie, Tasmania. Frederick Vincent stated on his Attestation Papers that he had served 2 years with Cadets. He also stated he had previously been rejected from Camp owing to his parents' consent.

Private Frederick Allan Vincent was posted to 1st Depot Battalion, Claremont Camp, Tasmania on 28th May, 1918 for recruit training.

Private Frederick Allan Vincent embarked from Hobart, Tasmania on T.S.S. *Moeraki* on 6th July, 1918. He was posted to Liverpool Camp, Sydney, NSW on 8th July, 1918.

Private Frederick Allan Vincent embarked from Sydney, NSW on HMAT *Borda (A30)* on 17th July, 1918 with the 2nd Tasmanian General Service Reinforcements & disembarked at London, England on 27th September, 1918.

The Conduct Sheet for Private Frederick Allan Vincent has an entry for Black Boy Hill on 30th July, 1918 – *"Disobedience of Orders"*. Punishment was 72 hours detention. Above this entry is written: *"Claremont Camp certified correct."* (Note: Blackboy Hill was in Western Australia. Claremont Camp was in Tasmania. On 30th July, 1918 Private Vincent was on board HMAT *Borda* on his way from Sydney to England).

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Frederick Allan Vincent was marched in to 9th Training Battalion at Fovant, Wiltshire, England on 27th September, 1918 from Australia. He was posted to Reinforcements of 40th Battalion whilst at 1st Training Battalion on 27th September, 1918.

Private Frederick Allan Vincent was marched in to R.B.A.A. (Reserve Brigade Australian Artillery) at Heytesbury, Wiltshire on 4th October, 1918 from 2nd Training Brigade at Fovant.

Private Frederick Allan Vincent was sent sick to Group Clearing Hospital, Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 5th October, 1918 with Influenza. He was transferred & admitted to Military Hospital, Sutton Veny & was reported to be seriously ill with Influenza Pneumonia on 9th October, 1918.

Private Frederick Allan Vincent died at 00.30 on 11th October, 1918 at Military Hospital, Sutton Veny, Wiltshire from Cardiac Failure after Influenza Pneumonia.

A death for Frederick Vincent, aged 22, was registered in the December quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire, England.

Private Frederick Allan Vincent was buried on 17th October, 1918 in London Road Cemetery, Salisbury, Wiltshire, England – Plot number R. 33 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone. From the burial report of Private Frederick Allan Vincent - *Coffin was good, polished Elm, brass mounts. Deceased was buried with full military honors, the coffin draped with the Australian flag was borne to the Graveside on a Gun-Carraige preced b y a firing party and band. Six of the Deceased's comrades acted as Pall-Bearers. Three Officers and about thirty N.C.O.s and Men of the Deceased's Unit attended as Mourners. Headquarters, A.I.F. London were represented at the funeral.*

Private Frederick Allan Vincent requested in his Will, dated 21st June, 1918, that in the event of his death the whole of his property & effects be given to his mother – Alice Mary Vincent, Upper Burnie, Tasmania.

Base Records contacted Mrs A. M. Vincent, Upper Burnie, Tasmania in June, 1921 stating she was noted on the records for the late Private F. A. Vincent as the registered next-of-kin but desired to know if there were any nearer blood relatives than herself due to the "Deceased Soldiers Estates Act 1918" which stated that the War Medals & Mementoes of a deceased soldier were to be handed in the following order of relationship – Widow, eldest surviving son, eldest surviving daughter, father, mother, eldest surviving brother, eldest surviving sister etc. Base Records specifically asked if his father was still alive.

Base Records wrote to Headquarters, 6th District Base on 29th November, 1922 stating that they had written to Mrs A. M. Vincent in June 1921 requesting to know if the father of the late Private F. A. Vincent was still alive & if so his address. No reply had been received from Mrs Vincent so they requested "*if you can obtain the desired information – possibly the War Gratuity files may be able to assist.*"

6th District Base replied to Base Records on 8th December, 1922 stating

Private Frederick Allan Vincent was entitled to British War only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Vincent's father – Mr H. Vincent, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll & Plaque sent January, 1923).


The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Frederick Allan Vincent – service number 56619, of Australian Reinforcement. He was the son of Henry and Alice Vincent, of Burnie. "the father is living. His address is as follows: - Mr Henry Vincent, Upper Burnie, Tasmania."

Private F. A. Vincent is commemorated on the Roll of Honour, located in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 133.

Frederick Allan Vincent is remembered on the Wall of Remembrance, at the War Memorial, Cecilia Street, St. Helens, Tasmania. The Wall of Remembrance commemorates those from Tasmania who died in service or were killed in action in World War One.

Front Inscription

Tasmania's World War One Roll of Honour, 1914 - 1918

The names of 3165 soldiers, sailors and airmen who were Tasmanian by birth or residence and died from their service in WW1 are commemorated on these walls. Their names appear alphabetically, grouped by the year of death. These men served with Australian, New Zealand and British units.

"What these men did nothing can alter now. The good and the bad, the greatness and the smallness of their story will stand. Whatever of glory it contains nothing now can lessen. It rises, as it will always rise, above the mists of ages, a monument to great hearted men; and for their nation, a possession forever. "

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around $3\frac{1}{2}$ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.


Private F. A. Vincent does not have a personal inscription on his headstone.


