His Duty Nobly Done

William Bertram WAKEFIELD

William Bertram Wakefield was born at Lachlan, Tasmania on 29th August, 1894 to parents William & Annie Eliza Wakefield (nee Cordwell). He was baptised on 24th October, 1894 at New Norfolk, Tasmania.

Eliza Ann Wakefield, mother of William Bertram Wakefield, died on 26th August, 1909 at Lachlan, Tasmania, aged 34. She died the day her son Maurice Bevis Richard Wakefield was born.

William Bertram Wakefield was a 22 year old, single, Farm Hand from New Norfolk, Tasmania when he enlisted at Claremont, Tasmania on 16th October, 1916 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His religion was Methodist & his next of kin was listed as his father – Mr William Wakefield of New Norfolk, Tasmania. William Bertram Wakefield had served with Senior Cadets for 2 years.

Private William Bertram Wakefield, Service number 2898, embarked from Melbourne, Victoria on HMAT *Orsova* (*A67*) on 6th December, 1916 with the 40th Infantry Battalion, 6th Reinforcements & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 17th February, 1917. Private Wakefield had been admitted to Ship's Hospital while at Sea from 10th to 18th January, 1917 for Observation.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private William Bertram Wakefield was marched in to 14th Training Battalion on 18th February, 1917. He was marched in to Camp Details at Sutton Mandeville, Wiltshire from 14th Training Battalion on 7th March, 1917. Private Wakefield was marched out to Durrington, Wiltshire on 23rd April, 1917.

Private William Bertram Wakefield proceeded Overseas to France from No. 12 Camp, Durrington on 23rd July, 1917 via Southampton. He was marched in to 3rd Australian Division Base Depot at Havre, France on 24th July, 1917. Private Wakefield was taken on strength with 40th Battalion from Reinforcements from 3rd Australian Division Base Depot at Havre, France on 10th August, 1917.

Private William Bertram Wakefield proceeded on Leave to Paris on 14th March, 1918 & rejoined his Unit from Leave on 22nd March, 1918.

Private William Bertram Wakefield was wounded in action on 31st August, 1918. He was admitted to 37th Casualty Clearing Station then transferred to 11th Stationary Hospital at Rouen, France on 1st September, 1918. Private Wakefield was invalided to UK on 4th September, 1918 on Hospital Ship *Marguerita*.

Private William Bertram Wakefield was admitted to Boscombe Military Hospital at Bournemouth, Hampshire, England on 5th September, 1918 with a gunshot wound to neck. He was discharged to Furlo on 8th October, 1918.

Private William Bertram Wakefield was marched in to No. 1 Command Depot at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire from furlo on 22nd October, 1918 & medically classified as B1 A2 (fit for Overseas Training Camp in three to four weeks).

Private William Bertram Wakefield was sent sick to Group Clearing Hospital at Sutton Veny on 4th November, 1918 with Influenza & then transferred & admitted to the Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 5th November, 1918 seriously ill with Pneumonia.

Private William Bertram Wakefield died at 13.30 hrs on 7th November, 1918 at the Military Hospital, Sutton Veny of Pneumonia.

A death for William B. Wakefield, aged 24, was registered in the December quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Private William Bertram Wakefield was buried at 3 pm on 11th November, 1918 in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire, England - Grave no. 27.

From the burial report of Private Wakefield - Coffin was polished Elm with Brass Mounts – Deceased was buried with full Military Honours, the body being conveyed to the graveside on a Gun Carriage preceded by a Firing Party and Band from No. 1 Australian Command Depot. Six comrades of deceased supported the Pall. 3 Officers and about 30 N.C.O.'s and Men from No. 1 Command Depot followed the remains and were present at the graveside ceremony. A floral wreath from Miss N. Abbott was laced on the grave. Headquarters A.I.F. Depots in United Kingdom were represented at the funeral. Also in attendance at the funeral were Mrs & Miss Abbott (Friends) of 25 Capstone Rd. Bournemouth & Mrs Penfold (Friend) (address as above).

Private William Bertram Wakefield requested in his Will, dated 17th July, 1917, that he bequeathed his personal estate to his father – William Wakefield of Lachlan, New Norfolk, Tasmania.

Private William Bertram Wakefield was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Wakefield's father – Mr W. Wakefield (Scroll sent December, 1922 & Plaque sent November, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private William Bertram Wakefield, 2898, of 40th Battalion, Australian Infantry, A.I.F., as the son of William and Annie Eliza Wakefield, of Lachlan, Tasmania.

Private W. B. Wakefield is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 133.



Mr W. Wakefield, of the Lachlan, has received advice from the Base Records Office that his son, Private W. B. Wakefield, has been wounded, and admitted to Boscombe Military Hospital, Bournemouth, England. He is suffering from a gunshot wound in the neck, but it was not stated if the wound was serious.

Mr. W. Wakefield, of Lachlan has received official information that his son, Private William Bertram Wakefield has died of pneumonia in Sutton Veny Military Hospital. He enlisted in October, 1916, and saw much fighting in France, where he was wounded in September last. An in memoriam service is to be conducted in the Lachlan State-school on Sunday afternoon by the Rev. H. M. Knuckey.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.





Original Cross marker for Private William Bertram Wakefield in Churchyard at Sutton Veny

St. John the Evangelist Churchyard, Sutton Veny, Wiltshire, England

During the two world wars, the United Kingdom became an island fortress used for training troops and launching land, sea and air operations around the globe. There are more than 170,000 Commonwealth war graves in the United Kingdom, many being those of servicemen and women killed on active service, or who later succumbed to wounds. Others died in training accidents, or because of sickness or disease. The graves, many of them privately owned and marked by private memorials, will be found in more than 12,000 cemeteries and churchyards. The 26th Division was concentrated at Sutton Veny in April 1915 and No 1 Australian Command was there from the end of 1916 to October 1919. There was also a hutted military hospital of more than 1200 beds at Sutton Veny for much of the war and No 1 Australian General Hospital was stationed there after the Armistice. Sutton Veny (St John) Churchyard contains 168 First World War burials, 167 of them in a plot at the north west corner of the church. Of these, 143 are Australian. There is only one Second World War burial in the churchyard.
