## **Ernest Henry WILKES**

Ernest Henry Wilkes was born at Launceston, Tasmania on 24th January, 1900, a twin, to parents Simeon & Elizabeth Ann Wilkes (nee Barnes).

Ernest Henry Wilkes & his twin brother Hector Burns Wilkes attended Glen Dhu State School, Tasmania.

Ernest Henry Wilkes was an 18 year old, single, Labourer from Launceston, Tasmania when he enlisted at Launceston, Tasmania on 20th August, 1918 with the 3rd (T) Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 63372 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs E. A. Wilkes of Sandhill, Launceston, Tasmania (Father deceased - 1907). Hector Burns Wilkes, twin brother of Ernest Henry Wilkes also enlisted on the same day. He was given a service number of 63373. As both Ernest Henry & Hector Burns Wilkes were under the age of 21 years, they needed their parents' consent for them to enlist in the Australian Imperial Force for active service abroad. Mrs Elizabeth Ann Wilkes signed her consent for her twin sons to enlist.

Private Ernest Henry Wilkes embarked from Melbourne on SS *Zealandic* on 5th October, 1918 & disembarked at London, England on 5th December, 1918.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Ernest Henry Wilkes was marched in to 1st Training Battalion, Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 5th December, 1918 & allotted to Reinforcements of 12th Battalion.

Private Ernest Henry Wilkes was admitted to the 1st Australian General Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 27th January, 1919 with Influenza. He was reported as dangerously ill with Pneumonia later that day.

Private Ernest Henry Wilkes died at 7.45 am on 12th February, 1919 at the 1st Australian General Hospital, Sutton Veny of Broncho Pneumonia.

A death for Ernest H. Wilkes, aged 19, was registered in the March quarter, 1919 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Private Ernest Henry Wilkes was buried on 15th February, 1919 in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 64. From the burial report of Pte E. H. Wilkes - *Coffin was Elm with Brass Mounts – Deceased was buried with full Military Honours, the coffin draped with the Australian flag being borne to the graveside on a Gun Carriage preceded by a Firing Party from No. 1 Australian Command Depot. Six of deceased's late Unit comrades supported the Pall. Headquarters A.I.F. Depots in United Kingdom were represented at the funeral. Also in attendance at the funeral was (Brother) Sapper W. G. Wilkes, 483, 4th F.C.R.* 

Private Ernest Henry Wilkes requested in his Will dated 1st October, 1918 that all his property & effects be left to his mother – Mrs Elizabeth Ann Wilkes of Sandhill, Launceston, Tasmania.

Private Ernest Henry Wilkes was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Wilkes' mother – Mrs E. A. Wilkes (Scroll sent August, 1921 & Plaque sent October, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Ernest Henry Wilkes, 63372, of 12th Battalion, Australian Infantry, A.I.F., as the son of Simeon and Elizabeth Ann Wilkes of Sand Hill South, Launceston, Tasmania.

Private E. H. Wilkes is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 68.



E. H. Wilkes is remembered on the Wall of Remembrance, at the War Memorial, Cecilia Street, St. Helens, Tasmania. The Wall of Remembrance commemorates those from Tasmania who died in service or were killed in action in World War One.

#### **Front Inscription**

Tasmania's World War One Roll of Honour, 1914 - 1918

The names of 3165 soldiers, sailors and airmen who were Tasmanian by birth or residence and died from their service in WW1 are commemorated on these walls. Their names appear alphabetically, grouped by the year of death. These men served with Australian, New Zealand and British units.

"What these men did nothing can alter now. The good and the bad, the greatness and the smallness of their story will stand. Whatever of glory it contains nothing now can lessen. It rises, as it will always rise, above the mists of ages, a monument to great hearted men; and for their nation, a possession forever. "



#### **Connected to Private Ernest Henry Wilkes:**

Twin brother – Pte Hector Burns Wilkes, 63373, 12th Battalion. Admitted to 1st Australian General Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire. Returned to Australia from England on 3rd May, 1919. Entitled to British War Medal only. Hector Burns Wilkes died on 8th June, 1968 in Launceston, Tasmania.

Older Brother – Sapper Walter Gordon Wilkes, 483, 4th Field Company Engineers. Enlisted 28th February, 1916. Returned to Australia from England 12th May, 1919. Entitled to British War Medal & Victory Medal. Walter Gordon Wilkes died 28th August, 1968 at Heidelberg, Victoria.

Mrs E. A. Wilkes, Sandhill, Launceston, has been advised by the Base Records Office that two telegrams of February 11, stating that Private Hector Wilkes, 12th Battalion, was dangerously ill and admitted to the 1st Australian General Hospital, suffering from broncho-pneumonia, were incorrect and referred to Private N. B. Wilkes's twin brother, Private Ernest Wilkes, who died on February 12.

#### Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

## Sadly Missed

### St. John the Evangelist's Churchyard, Sutton Veny, Wiltshire, England

The 26th Division was concentrated at Sutton Veny in April 1915 and No 1 Australian Command was there from the end of 1916 to October 1919. There was also a hutted military hospital of more than 1200 beds at Sutton Veny for much of the war and No 1 Australian General Hospital was stationed there after the Armistice. Sutton Veny (St John) Churchyard contains 168 First World War burials, 167 of them in a plot at the north west corner of the church. Of these, 143 are Australian. There is only one Second World War burial in the churchyard.
