David Cairns YOUNG

David Cairns Young was born at Corowa, NSW on 8th June, 1892 to parents David Cairns Young & Isabella Young (nee Northey). He was a 25 year old, single, Engine Driver from "Riverina" Maher Street, Hurstville, NSW when he enlisted at Wangaratta, Victoria on 1st May, 1918 with the 8th (V) Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 60790 & his religion was Presbyterian. His next of kin was listed as his father – Mr D. C. Young of "Riverina" Maher Street, Hurstville, NSW. David Young enlisted under the name David "Carens" Young & stated on his Attestation Papers that he had previously been rejected as unfit for His Majesty's Service due to his heart.

Private David Young embarked from Melbourne on HMAT *Marathon (A74)* on 23rd July, 1918 & disembarked at London, England on 27th September, 1918.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private David Young was marched in to 1st Training Battalion at Fovant, Wiltshire & allotted to Reinforcements of 7th Battalion on 27th September, 1918.

Private David Young was sent sick to Group Clearing Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 17th October, 1918 – P.U.O. (Pyrexia (fever) of unknown origin). He was transferred & admitted to the Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 21st October, 1918 seriously ill with Pneumonia.

Private David Cairns Young died at 10.45 pm on 23rd October, 1918 at the Military Hospital, Sutton Veny of Influenza & Pneumonia.

A death for David C. Young, aged 26, was registered in the December quarter, 1918 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Private David Cairns Young was buried at 3 pm on 29th October, 1918 in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 13 (CWGC has grave No. as 12). From the burial report of Pte Young - Coffin was polished Elm with Brass Mounts – Deceased was buried with full Military Honours. The funeral was preceded by a Firing Party and Band from the 1st Australian Training Battalion. Six of deceased's late Unit comrades supported the Pall. 2 Officers and about 50 N.C.O.'s and Men from deceased's late Unit followed the remains and were present at the graveside ceremony. Headquarters A.I.F. Depots in United Kingdom were represented at the funeral.

Pte David "Carens" Young requested in his Will dated 12th June, 1918 that the whole of his property and effects be left to his father Mr David "Carens" Young of Hurstville, Sydney, NSW.

Pte D. C. Young is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial,

Canberra, Australia on Panel 52.




Pte David Cairns Young was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of war. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Young's father – Mr D. C. Young (Scroll sent July, 1921 & Plaque sent November, 1922).

The CWGC lists Private David Cairns Young, 60790 of 7th Battalion, Australian Infantry, A.I.F., as the son of David Cairns Young and Isabella Young, of "Riverina" Maher St, Hurstville, New South Wales. Born at Corowa.


Newspaper Reports

DISTRICT NEWS

Word was received here last week that Pte Young, second son of Mr and Mrs D. C. Young, late of Corowa but now of Cooma, had died in England from the effects of Pneumonia. This young lad had only arrived in the homeland, accompanied by Pte Wm. Oswald and one or two other district lads. No details are to hand beyond the fact of his death. Prior to leaving Corowa deceased, who was about 25 years of age, was employed at the Riverina Harvester Works.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
